The Rector Writes

Young children do not always do what their parents tell them. Human beings do not always do what God tells them.

The rather harassed mother was getting the tea ready. Her young son Sam had slipped into the front room unnoticed. He was a lively young lad who loved climbing. His mum had often told him to be careful climbing and she definitely had told him not to climb up on the furniture. Yet his mum was not there so Sam got up on to the sofa and then on to the window ledge and there he perched waving at people who went past.

Then he saw his friend go past and he was waving so frantically to attract his attention that he overbalanced and fell on to the floor. He howled because the floor was hard and he certainly was hurt. The tears flowed and his cries brought mum running in from the kitchen. What was her response as she quickly realised what had happened - "Serves you right for climbing up on the furniture - that will teach you a lesson - you need not think I am going to have any sympathy."


Mum put her arms around him and hugged him to herself, "There, there, everything will be all right - I'll hug the hurt away." Slowly in her embrace the sobs became less. She was sharing in some way his hurt and drawing it to herself. Eventually her embrace and her love neutralised his hurt, drew its sting and yes, soon everything was alright. As Sam was reassured by his mother's love so he did take to heart her words - "So you will remember Sam, not to climb on the furniture in future."

I wonder if we can take anything from this story to try to make sense of what was happening on the cross. Our disobedience was met by the love of Jesus and his embrace - holding out his arms on the cross to embrace

the brokenness and hurt of the world. And in some mysterious way he drew our sins and their hurt to himself and in doing so neutralised them so that in the end everything was all right.

We rightly affirm the truth that Jesus died on the cross for our sins. How it actually works is debated by theologians with all sorts of theories of what is known as the Atonement - the barrier of sin being removed to make us at one with God once again.

Our story may give us a little insight but ultimately we can't comprehend because we are mere creatures. We nevertheless can live by that truth and we have the assurance that while we may now 'see through a glass darkly', in the end all will be revealed. For while we affirm the truth that Jesus died for our sins we also affirm the truth that Jesus was raised to life to give us a whole new way of life. Easter puts aside all our present limitations - then we will see and then we will understand and then we will truly appreciate our God.

MESSY CHURCH

This is a new way of doing church that is being practised across the water and also in some Church of Ireland parishes in our own Dio-It may not seem a very cese. appropriate name until we realise that Jesus came into a messy world and through his ministry dealt with many messy lives. Today we might recognise that there is a somewhat messy nature to our Messy Church seeks to lives. reach out to those who are not presently involved in church. It is not a hard sell and might be termed a soft form of evangelism. It is an all age initiative. The idea is to gather people somewhere, to give them the experience of a short act of worship with a simple talk, alongside some craft activities which convey a Christian theme and an act of eating together.

While it is primarily intended for those outside the church we in-

tend to have Messy Church in place of the next Family Service in St Patrick's - Sunday 19th April. We trust that many who would normally come to this service will come along. We intend to leaflet some areas near to the church to invite outsiders and we would love our own folk to ask friends or relatives who presently are not involved in church to come along. This Messy Church will be held in the hall and is a one off trial to see if this could be an effective way to encourage people in the life of faith.

MINISTRY TEAM

This group of parishioners continues to meet every 2 months. Presently it is sponsoring the Discipleship Explored course and many of its members are acting as facilitators. It is also responsible for the layout of different services during Holy Week and has arranged for a Labyrinth Exhibition to be in place during that week.

For 2 years there have been regular vigils each term and again the Ministry Team oversees these. At our last meeting we also discussed opportunities that Messy Church might afford and how we might develop our relationship with the local Methodist Church, as well as the potential for some form of retreat/pilgrimage before the summer break. In the past the Ministry Team has undertaken some visiting around new housing developments in the town and it was reminded that this would be an ongoing task.

The Ministry Team is chosen by the rector and is there to minister under his leadership. With a new rector on the horizon the ministry

team will be considering the variety of ministries underway in the parish so that a new rector might be well informed and encouraged by some of the strengths and challenges of ministry in this place. A new rector will of course have his/her own thoughts and will bring their own strengths and will seek with others to shape ministry into the future.

- The Congo river is the world's deepest river.



The Curate's Letter

EASTER TIME, SPRING TIME, HAPPY TIME

If I'm ever asked what my favourite time of the year is, without a thought I will always give the answer of Easter. When we think of Easter words that spring to mind are 'Hope', 'New Beginnings', 'Purity', 'A Fresh Start'. When we look around we are reminded of things coming to life as we see little lambs, chicks, rabbits, trees turning brighter and greener, flowers springing up, the grass getting longer needing a cut, the days are brighter and longer, the air is fresher and clearer. All these things can't help but have a positive impact on our mood, even the birds chirping earlier in the morning is nice (most of the time). Easter is always seen as 'the start of something', whereas other times of the year I think of as 'the end of something'; Christmas is the end of the year, summer is the end of the school year.

I have memories, only happy ones, from a long time ago when I was a school child during the Easter holidays. On Easter Monday my mother and aunt used to take my cousins, my brother and myself to Bellevue Zoo to roll hard boiled eggs down the hill. I may have complained climbing up the hill but I still really enjoyed it. Easter Tuesday was always a trip on the train up to



Portrush where we would go on amusements, get covered in sand and eat chips, ice cream and other things bad for my teeth and waist line. When my two girls were growing up times had changed and instead of a hard-boiled egg, they always got a new outfit fresh from the shops and their pick of course for Easter and a chocolate egg also. Easter can only be seen as fun and a family time.

Although we think of the Easter story and imagine Jesus hanging on the cross and the pain he suffered for us, I still think of Easter as a happy time because darkness was turned into light and the world was made pure, clean, fresh. God's love for us put Jesus on the cross and that is why He was crucified.

In John 19:10-11 Pontius Pilate, prefect of Judea, with all the power and authority of the mighty Roman Empire behind him says to the flogged and humiliated Jesus, "Don't you realise I have power either to free you or to crucify you?" Jesus answered, "You would have no power over me if it were not given to you from above."

Jesus' death on the cross is no accident. It happens because He chooses to let it happen; because it is God's own plan for the salvation of the world. Earlier on in this gospel Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd and I lay down my life for the sheep. I lay down my life.....no one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord."

Jesus dies as the Lamb of God: the sacrifice that takes away the sins of all who trust in Him.

As the creed says, Jesus was crucified under Pontius Pilate. Pilate and Jews were the immediate cause of Jesus' crucifixion. However, what is required of us is that we recognise that their sins are our sins, and our sins as much as theirs nailed Jesus to the cross. Also though we must say, "My sins took Jesus to the cross," we must equally affirm, "His own love took Jesus to the cross." What a sacrifice, what love!

My favourite song at Easter is one from my school days: 'There is a green hill far away without a city wall, where the dear Lord was crucified, who died to save us all'. This is a beautiful Easter hymn written by Mrs Cecil F. Alexander. It is said that Mrs Alexander wrote this hymn while sitting at the bedside of her sick child. At the time she lived not far from the walls of Londonderry where her husband was the Bishop. The sight of the massive town walls and green hills beyond might well have inspired her to begin writing her well known passionate hymn for children. She wrote several other well known hymns such as, All Things Bright and Beautiful, The Christmas Carol and Once in Royal David's City, which Christians sing still today worldwide.

I wish you all a Happy Easter and encourage you to embrace New Beginnings.

GFS Leaders



For many years we as a parish have had a link with St Columba's Hospital Hazaribagh in India - about 200 miles north west of Calcutta. We remember the staff and work of the hospital in prayer and we make a yearly financial offering from our envelope scheme to the parish. As well as this many parishioners contribute through the small milk collection bottles and St Columba's Church also makes a special offering. Also of importance is the fact that our rector is chairman of the Friends of St Columba's Hospital and Barry Duke is the secretary. The Friends usually collect over £12,000 per annum to send to the hospital. The link has been fostered with the rector visiting the hospital 6 times over the last number of years and on 2 occasions he was joined by Ian McKay another parishioner. News about the hospital has been shared over the years and more recently the very future of the hospital has been in question. It is good therefore to bring parishioners up to date about the present situation.

Our good friends Dr Pushpa Dass and Shirley Imam who have been at the very centre of hospital life for very many years have now stepped down from their posts. Pushpa has been replaced as superintendent by Dr Sheuda Bengra though she continues to help on a part time base. Shirley has been replaced as administrator by Priyanka Sanga, a young Christian lady from the local parish who has training in hospital administration.


The main challenge for the hospital is to attract more doctors, to allow more admissions and to widen the range of medical disciplines and thus to generate more income. It is good to report that a new doctor has just joined the staff - Dr Anita Khalkho - and she has a mission heart and is ready to undertake night duties and thus is a valuable asset.

Priyanka is working hard to attract other medical staff whether full or part time and she needs our prayers in this difficult task. She has also upgraded the water supply from the bore well and this provides running water to many parts of the hospital - a big improvement and something funded from Ireland. She has plans to upgrade other parts of the hospital but clearly is curtailed by lack of money. She has been in post for nearly a year and has made a good start and has gradually gained the trust and respect of the staff.

The hospital comes under the care of the Diocese of Chotanagpur and is administered by a diocesan committee stationed in the state capital of Ranchi. While the life of the hospital is still precarious and functioning at a low level, it is to be hoped that new initiatives may attract new staff and patients and there are those working hard to this end. The Friends thus believe that it is important to continue to support the hospital and are due to send over £6,000 to the hospital. As a parish we too should continue in our support and could be challenged by the thoughts of Priyanka in her latest email.

'At this point of time I really need your prayers. I seek God's grace be with me and provide me strength to uphold the responsibilities that he had planned for this institution. I must say God is answering, and I can see it through the love and support from Friends of St Columba.'

Secretary's Notes

Since I last wrote there has been a great deal of progress with the work at St Patrick's and it is good to be able to report that the building works there are all complete and (so far at least) seem to have been successful. The return of the ringing chamber to much more like its original condition took a little getting used to, and the removal of the ceiling above the organ loft lets more of the sounds from the church carry up into the tower. We need Wells Kennedy to get the organ back into action now to discover if that is going to be too loud for comfort in the tower, or if we might also need to put in some kind of sound proofing again.

There continues to be a problem with dampness at Ballyclug, now thought to be rising damp due to the soak aways around the building not working efficiently any more. The possibility is that the internal plaster might have to be stripped from the east wall to allow treatment, and then of course all would have to be made good again in due course which would be much the bigger part of the job.

Just to prove that it isn't only the old buildings which need ceaseless care and attention there are now signs of weathering of the brickwork and render showing in places at St Columba's too. Internally the work on the new doors is progressing, though it isn't visible because it is all happening at the joiner's workshop at the moment.

Sadly, the Select Vestry have already had to turn our thoughts in some measure to the rector's retirement, in that the Church Representative Body will want us to do as much as we can to bring the rectory up to date once it becomes vacant. All those jobs of modernising and renewal that can't be easily done while the house is being lived in will have to be done to make it as attractive as possible for any new incumbent coming along. The 'powers that be' in control of such things will be making an inspection of the property and will no doubt give us a list of all that they think needs to be done in due course.



Vera had been in poor health for some time and Parkinson's disease had taken its toll. Her state of health necessitated her being in care and in Rylands she was quite restricted and had a limited quality of life. Nevertheless when visited by the clergy she would respond to talk about the parish and especially about the choir. She started her life in Cullybackey and worked in Gallahers before marriage and then after marriage as a hem stitcher. With Stanley her husband their first house was in Whiteabbey but then she wanted back to Cullybackey. They were to settle on the Carniny Road and this is the home their children and grandchildren will remember. Vera was the homemaker, a very good cook and very involved not only in the rearing of her own children but also the 7 grandchildren and then their children. She provided for all and all were able to enjoy her humour and infectious laugh. Vera had been a member of the parish for a long time and a faithful member of the choir for many years. She loved singing and as well as the choir she and others formed a small singing group which entertained around the locality. Even in the home she sang and indeed when other communication was limited she could still sing hymns and did so till the end. We remember her daughter Margaret and son Ernest and also the grandchildren Glen, Nigel, David, Clare, Jill, Nicola and Joanne.

Winterton Reid

Winterton's death was sudden and a shock to all. He was tending his mother's grave for Mother's Day when he suffered a heart attack. He had undergone major heart surgery 6 years ago but there had been no warning that his life was in danger. Winterton was brought up in Ballymena and after school studied at Greenmount. Horticulture was to be the great interest of his life - it was the area in which he worked and it was his passion outside work. He was to spend periods working in England both before and after marriage and for a time he had a horticultural shop in Ballymena. Eventually he was to settle locally working for many years with the Housing Executive. His spare time was also spent laying out gardens and nurturing plants. On occasions the church was to make use of his expertise through the survey of trees on church property. Winterton as well as having green fingers was also good with his hands in terms of DIY and could turn his hand to many jobs about the house. Although he was connected with the parish throughout his life it was in latter years and especially after his operation that he came to value worship in St Patrick's - he was a regular attendee at the mid week communion and enjoyed the fellowship afterwards. We remember his wife Frances, his son Christopher and daughter Joanna.
