

The Men's Fellowship Group have donated £120 to twin the ladies and gentlemen toilets in St Patrick's Parish Hall. By 'twinning' these toilets we are funding the construction of two toilets in a country such as Uganda, Congo or Nepal, where sanitation levels are extremely low and death rates due to poor sanitation and hygiene are very high. We often take our own sanitation for granted, forgetting how well protected we are from diseases such as cholera and typhoid, just by having clean and accessible toilets.

Why not twin your toilet at home, or encourage your office at work to get their toilets twinned? You will receive a framed picture of your twinned toilet from a location such as Uganda, Congo or Nepal.

It costs only £60 to have a toilet twinned, or if you raise £240 you can fund a whole toilet block at a displacement camp. Have a look on their website for more information www.toilettwinning.org.



#### 'THE WAY' YOUTH FELLOWSHIP




# Confirmation

# The Curate's Letter

#### WHO THEN IS THIS?



Sometimes in life we can be weighed down with big questions, questions that we have to ask, questions that need an answer for us to move on, questions that trouble us and worry us.

'Who then is this?' is a very simple question that was asked about Jesus, by the disciples, just after He had calmed the storm. It is said of Jesus that, 'he awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace! Be Still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm.' (Mk 4:39), and in response the disciples, were filled with great fear and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?" (V 41).

What a simple, and amazing, and powerful question to ask of Jesus - Who then is this?

It is a question that every one of us, having been presented with the person of Jesus Christ, need to genuinely ask, and genuinely answer - Who then is this? Have you ever asked this question and sought the answer?

C. S. Lewis the great writer, who was also a professor at Cambridge and at one part of his life an atheist, once said the following of Jesus:

"A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic - on a level with the man who says he is a poached egg - or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the son of God: or else a madman or something worse .... But let us not come up with any patronising nonsense about His being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to."

Genuinely asking ourselves the question - Who then is this? - of Jesus is, I would suggest, the most important question we are to ever ask ourselves. When we read God's word, when we prayerfully investigate who Jesus is, we can only really conclude that He is Lord. And then when we know this as the answer, all of our other worldly, big questions that can weigh us down, take on a whole new dimension, a whole new meaning.

The Sunday School teachers' Christmas dinner took place on Wednesday 13th December to acknowledge and thank our Sunday School teachers for all their work. Special thanks to the anonymous person who made a donation towards the dinner.





The Sunday School Nativity Service took place on Sunday 17th December. The children's nativity reflected on the messiness of the Christmas story through chocolate bars and sweets. It was great to see a good turn out. The service finished with refreshments in the hall.

Thank you to all who donated Christmas presents for the Salvation Army Appeal - these were gratefully received.

Also a big thank you to those who contributed to the Christian Aid Christmas Family Appeal - over £400 was raised.

Messy Church - Thanks to all those who braved the cold and ice to come to Messy Church. The theme was

Christingle - Jesus the light of the world. The hall was decorated with fairy lights and had lots of symbols and representation of Christingle and light. We looked at the history of the Christingle, we then made Christingles and had different crafts and games relating to the Christingle and Jesus being the light of the world. We showed a video clip on how Jesus shines his light in the world and how we can do likewise. We talked about how even in the darkest of circumstances Jesus' light shines, it never goes out. Thanks to all who helped on the Saturday (setting up) and also on the Sunday. We have a great team and it is very much appreciated.



The Sunday School children have been learning about the Lord's Prayer. We looked at different types of communication, spoken and sign. We are currently learning the Lord's Prayer in Makaton (a language using signs). We hope to show the congregation soon!



We welcomed Roger Cooke and Jen from CMSI to tell us all about this year's CMSI project Crossing Bridges using Bible stories from the life of Joseph and snapshots of the church in Egypt. Crossing Bridges explores themes of friendship, peace and reconciliation. It looks at how God watches over, provides for and uses his people and how he helps people to cross bridges and come together.

This year we want to help the church in Egypt by providing support for two of its programmes. Money raised this year will be used to fund the 'Tree of Hope' programme in one primary school. This includes training Christian and Muslim teachers in how to promote and develop mutual understanding and respect with their students. It supports children's cultural activities within the school and helps Christian and Muslim children learn about each other's faith and cultural traditions. It also

provides resources for the deaf unit in a school run by the Diocese which helps deaf children to receive quality education in a loving, caring context.

The children will receive Smartie tubes which they can fill with 20 pence pieces and then receive a packet of sweets in return. CMSI boxes will be left at the back of the church for the congregation.



Summer Madness is now booked - 12 children and 5 leaders will be going at the end of June. Over the next couple of months we will be doing some fundraising to help with the cost. Fireside quizzes will be on sale for £2. These will be available in all 3 churches. The young people will also be helping to provide a soup lunch on Sunday 25th February after the 11.30 am service. We hope you will be able to come and support us.

Over the past year, TLM NI has sent a total of £178,909 to hospitals and projects in five countries. Here is a summary of how your support has made an impact on the lives of those affected by leprosy:

#### Ethiopia

In Ethiopia donations from supporters in Northern Ireland were used to provide accommodation for rural leprosy patients in need of treatment from the leprosy specialist ALERT hospital, based in Addis Ababa. 400 patients were given a total of 2,400 nights safe lodging. Each patient was also given 3 meals each day of their stay. This provision enables patients to take time away from work and home life without being plunged into debt and poverty.

#### India

Your support has enabled 200 young people to attend school in the past year through the Catch Them Young programme, which seeks to help children in leprosy affected families to gain an education (see Yogita's story below). Work continues to repeal anti-leprosy laws in India, and supporters from Northern Ireland have been active in advocating for a bill which challenges these laws.

#### Nepal

Funds raised in Northern Ireland continue to support Anandaban Hospital, the central referral centre for leprosy cases in Nepal. The work of Anandaban, and the many satellite clinics across Nepal reached over 35,000 people in 2016! Over 1,100 pairs of protective footwear were distributed, and 177 reconstructive surgeries were carried out. Building has begun at Anandaban on the new operating theatre and general ward.

Your support brought about the purchase of new land and building for Patan Clinic in Kathmandu. Patan is now open 6 days a week (formerly

only open on a Wednesday), and provides much needed medicine and care to many people in a strategically ideal location.

#### Nigeria

Both Holley Memorial Hospital in Ochadumu, and Ekpene Obom Hospital have been supported in a variety of ways, including feeding programmes, medical supplies, and protective footwear. Your support has meant that 208 people were given vital treatment and medicine, while 75 people received protective footwear.

#### Tanzania

In the village of Samaria, a place where many people are leprosy affected, a bore hole and water pump was installed, which provides safe, clean water for the villagers. Improved hygiene has led to reports of reduction of infections and ulcers caused by leprosy.

The Community Health Education Programme, run by a group of 30 trained volunteers, screened 3,704 people for leprosy, STD's, HIV and malaria at mobile clinics in remote villages were health care is scarce. Of that number, 1,638 people received treatment and medicine.

Thank you for your support and help. It has made a difference to thousands of people affected by leprosy!

Project Focus: Catch Them Young, India

Meet Yogita, a 12-year-old girl from India. Yogita's mum had leprosy, and her family live in a leprosy village. Since the age of 7, supporters of The Leprosy Mission have funded Yogita's schooling. Last year, she noticed pale patches on her face. She began to get teased in school, and found that her hands were becoming weak.

Her mum recognised the signs of leprosy, and took Yogita to the Leprosy Mission hospital that had previously treated her. Here she was given medicine, treatment and care. Community workers from the

hospital visited her school and helped to dispel myths about leprosy. Yogita is now feeling much better. She is also back at school, and feeling a lot more accepted and confident.

The theme of this year's course is 'God's Mission and the Church today'. Sessions, which begin each evening at 7.30 pm, are as follows:


