



Famous Prayers

Prompted by our recent mini-series of studies on the structure and content of the Lord's Prayer, I want to share some other great prayers from Christian history and a little bit about the people behind these famous prayers.

'Almighty God, in whom we live and move and have our being, you have made us for yourself, so that our hearts are restless till they rest in you.

Grant us purity of heart and strength of purpose, so that no selfish passion may hinder us from knowing your will, no weakness from doing it.

Grant that in your light we may see light clearly and in your service find our perfect freedom.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.'

This extract from St Augustine's Confession has become a globally recognised and valued prayer. The famous Saint and Bishop had a rather turbulent journey in life and faith. Born of a pagan father and Christian

mother, the young Augustine rejects his Christian Faith and sets out to become a lawyer. With Mother's Day not far off, we thank God for Augustine's Godly mum - Monica. She never stopped praying for her son. His journey back to faith came to a climax when he heard a voice like a child call out to him saying, "Tolle Lege" which means pick up and read. The Bible drew him back to God. Keep going godly mums everywhere!

Secretary's Notes

This month the Select Vestry has been thinking about the future, looking to a slightly longer time-frame than we usually try to plan for, and beginning to consider how the parish might change in the times to come and how we might prepare ourselves for such change.

To begin with the Finance Committee has been thinking about converting the tennis courts behind the rectory into something a little more useful as outlined below:

'The Finance Committee has undertaken a feasibility study of using the space adjacent to the rectory in Galgorm Road. This entails the possibility of two semi-detached properties with options to sell or rent to provide an income to the parish (at this point it is thought that one would become a new curate's house and the other would be available to let). Plans have been drafted and are currently with the Planning Office for their consideration. Once a decision is made by the planners the Finance Committee and Select Vestry will carefully consider how best to proceed for the good of the parish'.

The Select Vestry is fully behind this exploration, especially in light of the very poor returns which can be obtained on the parish's investment funds, we think it would be a prudent option to turn this capital into property as an investment rather than keeping it in low yielding bonds and the like. Much of course depends on the view the Planning Department takes and whether or not they will be sympathetic to our proposal, and we'll let you know the outcome of the above application in due course.

In the nearer term, this spring will see us asking all of you for some input into the way resources are allocated and where the emphasis should go in what we do as part of our Parish Development project, so any and all ideas will be welcomed when the time comes, but you'll be getting full details of that closer to the date. For now though can we ask you to start thinking a little more deeply than usual about parish life and what you would like it to be, rather than what currently is.

Returning to the present - the uphill battle to sort out the wi-fi connectivity throughout the halls continues, as often happens what looked like an easy job turned out to be much tougher but God Willing the end is in sight. The long awaited screen and a revamp of the sound system in the main hall is getting nearer to reality each day. We hope all will be in place very soon.

We have had some complaints about the driving around St Patrick's again, especially over the speed with which some people still enter the grounds and travel around the east end of the church. Measures to reduce such problems are being considered and centre around re-instating a one way system through the grounds. Those of you with good memories might recall when Canon Lloyd proposed this in the past, but it never really caught on because it couldn't be enforced. However, we are looking at giving it another go, and making some alterations to the car park 'furnishings' and signs to encourage everyone to take heed this time. In the meantime though, can we appeal to all drivers around St Patrick's especially (but it applies to all of our sites just as importantly) to keep your speed down and exercise care to minimise the dangers.

Finally this month may I remind you that as Easter approaches again so does the Annual General Vestry meeting. If you intended to register to vote at the meeting but didn't get round to it then sorry but you've missed out for another year as the 2018 register is now closed. For everyone who is on the register it would be very good if you came along and at least heard for yourself what is happening, better still if you take part and make your views known, full details of the time and date will be widely available as the meeting approaches, but for now it will be held one evening in the week after Easter, so you'll be back from your Easter breaks by then.



The Curate's Letter



The world-famous preacher Billy Graham went to be with the LORD this week. He was in his 100th year and he lived a life of utter devotion to sharing the word of God with anyone he could reach. And reach people he did. His first rally was in 1947 when Graham was not even thirty years old and over the next 58 years he would go on to hold 417 crusades in 185 countries across 6 continents.

At one rally in Moscow in 1992, it was reported that of the 155,000 people who attended, a quarter came forward to Graham's altar call to accept Jesus as their LORD and Saviour! His message never altered - repent of your sins and believe on the LORD Jesus Christ and you will be saved. He never wavered from the text of the Bible he would hold open at the lectern. He was a faithful husband, a loyal friend to the great, the not-so-great, the good and the 'bad', he was a campaigner for Civil Rights and was consistently listed on the Gallup annual poll as one of the '10 Most Admired Men in the World'.

A hard act to follow? Most definitely. The rest of us are left to ponder how we could ever live up to such a life. And yet God doesn't ask us to.

Yes, the LORD uses such influential men and women to inspire, challenge and remind us of His holiness, goodness and majesty, but He also tenderly calls each one of us to His side. To spend time with the creator of the universe is a wonderful thing - and yet it is a discipline that I struggle to prioritise. Perhaps during this period of Lent, as we prepare mentally for the road to Jerusalem, the upper room, the Garden of Gethsemane, the cross and the empty tomb, you and I can be reminded that our lives don't have to look like anyone else's for us to have a lasting impact for God. Micah 6:8 reminds us to 'seek justice, love mercy and walk humbly before your God'. This is how Jesus lived, this is the model Billy Graham chose to follow and it is one that we can submit to with the help of the Holy Spirit and our Christian brothers and sisters. You are one of a kind, made in God's image and when you were made, God was pleased. His plan for you is one filled with purpose and hope and, this Lent, let's walk together remembering He did it all for us.







The theme of this year's course is 'God's Mission and the Church today'. Sessions, which begin each evening at 7.30 pm, are as follows:



Iris was born and brought up in Omagh and after leaving school she worked in a bakery. It was here that Iris met her future husband and they were married after a short time. They set up home in Antrim where Colin was born but they later moved to Ballymena. Iris took up a post as a bookbinder in the Tyrone Constitution and also worked as an usherette in the State Cinema. Iris loved her family and was most upset when her husband Jerry passed away.
