

Rectory Ramblings


It seems to be a season of anniversaries and August this year will mark the 20th anniversary of the Omagh bomb. One of those, I can remember where I was and what I was doing moments of the dark years of the troubles in our country. I remember being quietly weeping as Juliet Turner sang that powerful song 'Broken Things' at a memorial event in Omagh town centre shortly after the bombing - her voice and the lyrics were perfect - simply perfect. I am still deeply moved any time I stumble across that song. Between Ballyclug and St Columba's last Sunday morning it was on Radio Ulster and hit me hard - again. I had and was about to preach again about a very broken man Peter - post cross. Talk about a broken heart! Yet the Lord came close, forgave and restored him for courageous Christian ministry.

God uses broken people with broken hearts, broken pasts and uncertain futures. He certainly used Juliet Turner that day in Omagh to express the pain, desperation and need for hope in God, each other and a better future. I am sure I am not the only one to have been powerfully impacted in this way and by this song. You do not have a perfect rector nor a perfect curate. We are not a perfect parish - God forbid that we should ever think we are. But we can in all our brokenness still be loved by God, called by God, used by God and know something of his healing power and presence. Amen.



Christian Aid Week 2018

Christian Aid asks us to stand together this Christian Aid Week for dignity, for equality and for justice. 'Poverty,' they say, 'is an outrage against humanity. It robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive. But together we have the power to transform lives.'

You will remember from last month that this year Christian Aid are focusing on the victims of the ravages of the weather; victims like Macelin who lost everything in Hurricane Matthew and was hoping for a more substantial home than the concrete shower block he was sharing with his three daughters; victims like Vilia who having lost everything in the earthquake in 2010 had been lucky enough to have had a strong, safe and stable house built for her by Christian Aid's partner, Koral - and had then been able to give shelter to more than fifty other people when Hurricane Matthew struck Haiti; as is so often the case, the help given by Christian Aid allowed the recipient in turn to help others.

This month I'm adding the story of Jocelyne to the mix. When Hurricane Matthew struck, Jocelyne lost her home, animals and safety. She was forced to live 'in mud', with only a tarpaulin between her and the elements. When the tarpaulin shook in the wind, it sounded like another hurricane. Even now, her new home - made of sheet metal, wood and tarpaulin - is not secure and would offer no protection in the event of another hurricane; nor could her home keep her secure from anyone wanting to hurt her.

Of the 700 houses that Christian Aid funded after the earthquake in 2010 only one needed repair after Hurricane Matthew. What Christian Aid funds really does make a difference to the lives of the recipients; helping them to overcome poverty, to help themselves and others and to regain their dignity.

Our Christian Aid lunches will be in St Patrick's and St Columba's on Sunday 13th May. The lunches are always well-supported and apart from allowing us to support the work of Christian Aid they give us a chance to catch up with fellow parishioners and enjoy a bit of banter. We will, as usual, have envelopes out in all three churches so that you will be able to contribute to the work of Christian Aid by putting a contribution on the plate. If you pay tax, please remember that the contribution on the plate or at the lunch will be substantially increased if you fill in the Gift Aid form on the envelope.

Ballymena is known nationally as a generous community and our parish is always very generous when it comes to standing together with other Christians to forward the work of Christian Aid. Part of the effort that our parish does in Christian Aid Week is to go out and make a door-to-door




collection in the part of the town allotted to us. This enables non-churchgoers to contribute to Christian Aid and also acts as outreach and witness the banter here can be quite good too! Over the last few years we have lost some of our faithful col-

lectors and to continue this valuable work we are asking for volunteers from all three churches to come forward to help. Don't Forget to Remember



One of the most important things to do before God, and one of the easiest things to forget to do, is to remember to be THANKFUL to the Lord. As the song goes: 'Count your many blessings; name them one by one, And it will surprise you what the Lord has done.'

Being thankful to God, I think is a great place to start! It's a great place to start our day, it's a great place to start our prayers, it's a great place to start full stop. Life, our problems, our challenges, our suffering can gain a whole new perspective if we remember to begin with thankfulness to the Lord.

I, like all of us, can forget to remember to be thankful for so much. The family we have been blessed with, the health we have been given, our upbringing, the wealth and the comfort we enjoy. Not that we are to ignore, or to be grateful for, our painful times, but that through our union with Christ we can have an overflowing thankfulness to God, that can provide us with a solid basis to meet and get through any challenge we are given in life.

I invite us not to forget to remember to practice thankfulness to God in our lives. Regardless of circumstances try to start off with thankfulness to God, to remember that through Christ we have an eternal hope to look forward to, and then he is there to lean on when times are tough.




The following week, continuing with the spring theme, we visited a farm to learn about the journey from egg to chick! A great night was had by all.
