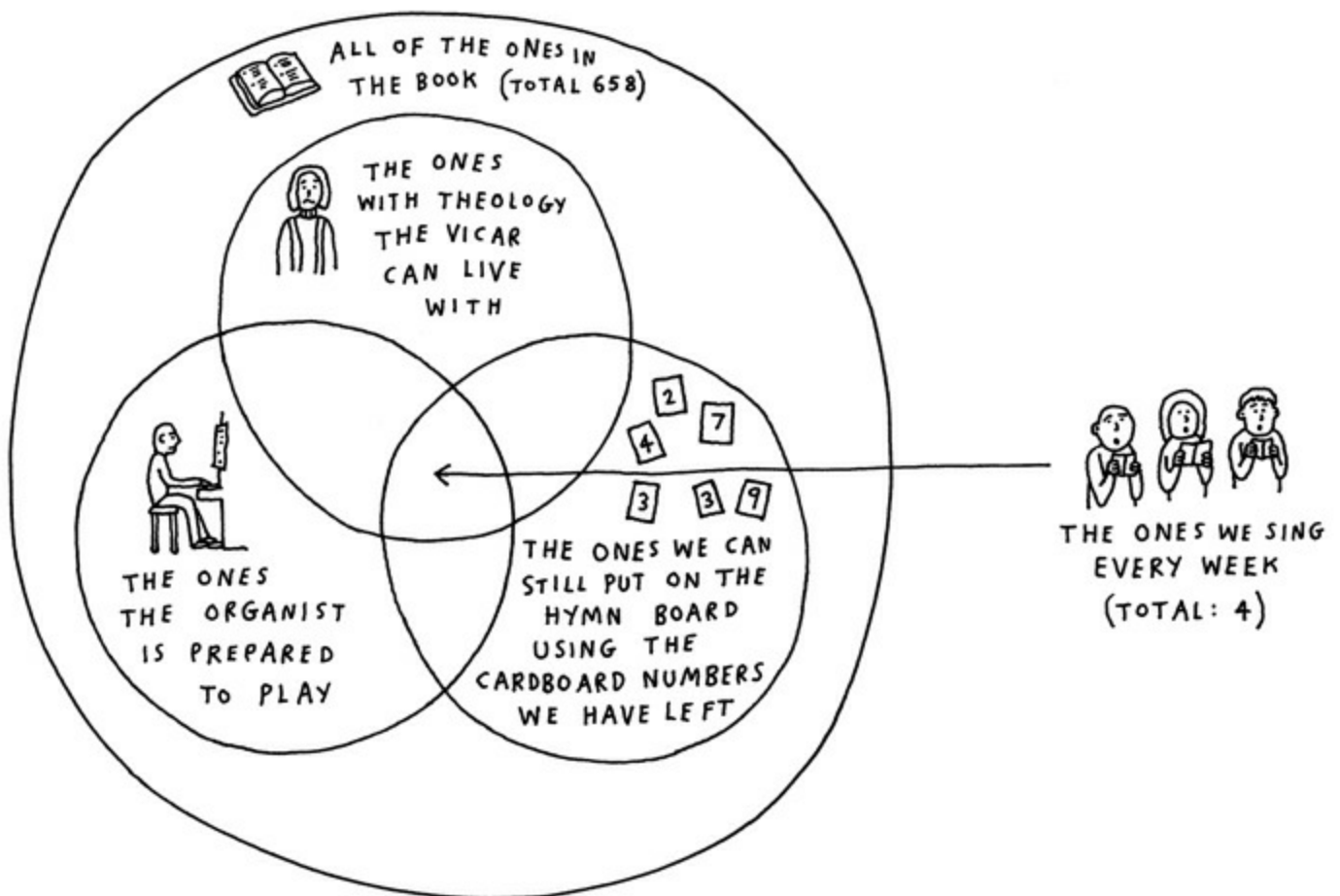

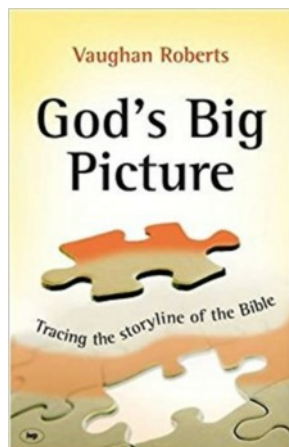


# Parish News

## LEST WE FORGET

As we are coming up to Remembrance Sunday our thoughts are with those who didn't make the return journey home. One such person was Francis Cavendish Roche who came to our parish as a curate. Francis had fought as a trooper in the North Irish Horse during the South African Boer War. Upon returning from military service in South Africa he took up Holy Orders.



He arrived in Ballymena in 1908 as a curate to the Reverend Austin and it didn't take long for him to become one of the parish family who was held in high esteem by children and adults alike. When he arrived one organisation that had been closed for several years was the CLB. Reverend Roche took on the job of getting it up and running again and became chaplain. It is said the CLB flourished again during his time in the parish.

In 1911 he took up a curacy in England and again it was reported how this parish too, took him to their hearts. When WW1 broke out in 1914 he immediately applied to become a chaplain to the forces. His application was quickly accepted and now Captain The Reverend Francis Roche was on his way to the Dardanelles. In November 1915 he became ill with typhoid fever and died. He was buried at Chatby Cemetery, Egypt.

When word got back to England that he had died St Mary's parishioners added a canopy and memorial plaque to him in the Priest's Stall which still stands to this day.

# Christian Aid

## Christian Aid

**Christian Aid** in Belfast has sent us a letter thanking us for our efforts during Christian Aid Week back in May. You will remember that as a parish we were able, through church collections, lunches at St Patrick's and St Columba's and door-to-door collections, to raise the sum of £3,116. 26. A considerable amount of that sum was Gift Aided so the overall total that **Christian Aid** will have at their disposal is much more. As you know, this year **Christian Aid** was focusing on the plight of refugees - a problem that, as we see from the news, has not gone away; indeed it seems to be raising its head in more places than ever before.

It was inspiring to see a picture of Theodor Davidovic, a refugee after the Second World War, on this year's envelopes and to read his comment, '**It was Christian Aid who fed us, and I will never forget it.**' Theodor himself is now a **Christian Aid** volunteer!

The office in Belfast is still busy processing all the Gift Aid forms and so we are not yet sure of an overall total for Northern Ireland - but can be fairly confident that it is up on last year; this can only be reassuring when you consider the many scenarios in which **Christian Aid** will be working throughout the year, not only with refugees but also with others caught up in the aftermath of natural disasters and the like. It will be interesting to see the final total for Northern Ireland, with contributions from groups belonging to so many different Christian denominations and organisations - this is certainly one instance in which we all pull together!

# The Curate's (Wife's) Letter

Dennis is cheating a bit this month, and has asked me, his wife Jen, to share with you a recent blog which I wrote for my work in CMSI (Church Mission Society Ireland).

In the early pages of Charles Dickens' perennially popular novella, 'A Christmas Carol', the main character Scrooge is displaying his disdain for humankind. Two men have come calling on business on Christmas Eve to fund raise for the poor and destitute, many of whom would rather die than end up in the poor house. Scrooge's attitude to such folk is clear when he states, "If they would rather die, they had better do it and decrease the surplus population." Later in the story, Scrooge is taken by the Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come to a deprived part of London and the house of his poorly paid clerk, Bob Cratchitt. Scrooge silently observes Bob's family mourning the loss of their young son Tiny Tim, whose death from illness might have been prevented had they had more income. Scrooge is deeply moved by the tender scene of sadness and despair mingled with humility and thankfulness for the life of Tiny Tim. Then the ghost reminds him of his earlier words to the fund raisers in his office ... "If they would rather die, they had better do it and decrease the surplus population." Scrooge is greatly chastened and saddened by his former attitude - his heart is beginning to soften.



This story brings me to tears on an annual basis, especially when performed by Michael Caine in the Muppet Christmas Carol and when I watch it alongside my own children. Something happens to Scrooge when he actually sees the Cratchitt family first-hand and bears witness to their experience.

Scrooge's observation is part of leading him to becoming a new man with a heart for kindness and justice.

The stories that we, at CMSI, regularly tell are an attempt to provide an insight into the real lives, struggles and trials, hopes and achievements of our Global Partners as they walk by faith in Christ. These stories regularly chasten us and our supporters as we learn from our Christian brothers and sisters across the world and motivate us to think, act and respond in new ways. In my own role as Administration Coordinator for CMSI, I often see these responses first hand - when I open the post and see a handwritten note from one of our supporters who was greatly moved by a recent story we shared on the drought in Kenya, often accompanied by an offer of prayer over our work and a donation. When one of the CMSI family calls in person and hands me an envelope of cash because they couldn't carry on with their day until they had done something for those displaced from their homeland because of civil war in South Sudan. Or when I book the airline tickets for teams and individuals who have felt called to visit and spend time with our Global Partners in order to strengthen a parish link and build up the family of God.

Many of CMSI's members and supporters already understand and try to live out Jesus' call to love God and love others and the stories from our Global Partners encourage them to keep going with this call. For others, like Scrooge, as Dickens describes his wonderful transformation from miser to carer, the Holy Spirit can mightily use these real-life stories of love and perseverance within hardship to radically transform hearts. Scrooge went on to become, "... as good a friend, as good a master, and as good a man, as the good old city knew ...". May we have hearts that hear God's call to us as we listen to the stories we are told.

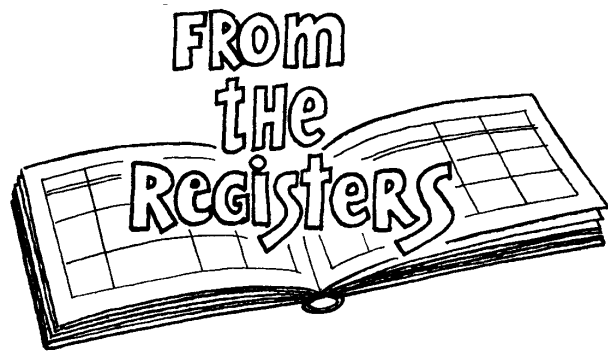

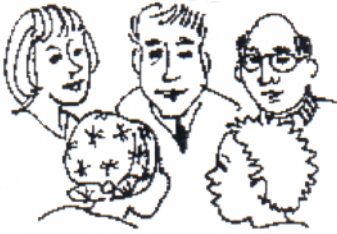
