

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The Rector Writes

I decided to have Irish stew for tea - it's one of the meals I can manage fairly well. Having got all the ingredients in the pot I put it on the electric cooker to heat it up. I then would move it across to the slow burning Esse cooker to let it simmer for an hour or two. While waiting for it to heat up I had time to ring Nepal to get the latest news.

Engrossed with this I then remembered that I needed to get to the hairdressers before the children got out of school and swamped the place.

So there I am sitting in the barber's chair chatting away when it suddenly comes into my mind - the Irish stew on full heat back at home. Now usually I am for getting full value in the barbers but on this occasion I wanted them to do as little as possible and soon I was cycling frantically back home. I was passed by no fire engines making for the rectory so at least that was something. I rushed in expecting to be hit by that awful smell of



burning and at the least to behold frizzled Irish stew and one ruined pot. Absolutely nothing but cat sleeping contently on the sofa - not a whiff of burning and no pot on the electric stove. Yes it was sitting on the slow burner simmering away nicely - I had completely forgotten that despite my hurry I had transferred the pot to its rightful place.

Ah well - I expect with advancing years some forgetfulness is acceptable. After all that morning I had searched for ages up at the church and hall for an important document - I had forgotten that I had left it in a tray back at the rectory. Yes we all will admit to a certain forgetfulness and we reassure each other that it's all part of the journey of life.

Yet there is another type of forgetfulness that we need to take heed of that ultimately is serious because it means that we will miss out on so much. I speak of a forgetfulness concerning spiritual matters. I doubt if there are many reading this article who have turned their back on God, who would claim to be atheists or who would debunk Christianity. There might, however, be those who have forgotten somewhat about God and matters of faith - people who in the midst of all else that is going on in their lives have let slip the practise of their faith.

Remembering is something that the bible calls us to do. Clearly one of the commandments tells us to, 'Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy'. This is all about the rhythm of life and having space for God and time for him. One of the pivotal events for the Jewish people was their delivery from slavery in Egypt and their leading to the promised land. They are warned again and again that when they at last settle in that land and things are going well for them they are to remember - to remember that it is God that has done all this for them and all that they have is from him. The message that is driven home is, 'Be careful that you do not forget the Lord your God'.

As Christians our foremost act of worship is based around remembering. The Holy Communion meal was given to us so that we might remember. Thus on millions of occasions through the ages the followers of Jesus have heard the words, 'Do this in remembrance of me'. We do it again and again to remember the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and how the good news that he embodies changes everything. We remember - that is we bring these events into the present and we engage with them. The good news that he brought so long ago is the good news we embrace today.

We may often own up to being somewhat forgetful in life and shrug it off. It very much saddens God if we tend to forget about him because he has so much to offer us and he certainly wants us to get the good news.





Parish News

A NEW RECTOR

Parishioners frequently ask - do we know who the new rector is going to be? The answer is no - and the process for finding a new rector really only begins when the present rector stands down. Then due process, as laid down by the church, takes place.

First what is known as The Permanent Commission for the Archdeaconry of Dalriada meets. considers if the present parish is to remain the same and if it can afford a rector. In our case there should be few questions here. Then the Board of Nomination goes about its work. This is made up of 4 members of our parish chosen at the last triennial election - Jim Perry, Patricia McWhirter, Alex McKay and Barry Duke and several lay and clerical people from the diocese. The parish nominators will draw up a parish profile and then the job will be advertised. Those who express an interest will receive relevant data about the parish and our nominators will have an opportunity to learn more about possible candidates through visiting their churches and through interviewing them.

The board may meet several times to consider how matters are proceeding and the bishop may suggest some names of other clergy who might be approached. Hopefully within 3 months of the board first meeting the members can agree on their first choice and if that person is willing to take on the work. If no agreement can be reached within 3 months the choice then falls to the bishop. Once a choice has been successfully made there will ensue a period before that person can begin in Ballymena - it is likely that they will need some time to finish off in their present work.

Our parish nominators have been given this important responsibility. They are not required during the process to consult the rest of the parish nor to share progress with the parish. They act independently and no influence should be brought on them. Entrusted with this responsibility parishioners should simply pray for them.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

We would love to see, and it would be encouraging for the leaders, all the children on our Sunday School roll to be regular attendees. One of the challenges we face is that often one Sunday there are very few in a class and then the following Sunday it is full. We would strongly encourage parents to bring their children regularly as this is how the children will most benefit from the experience. Just as we acknowledge the need for our children not to miss school so hopefully we can recognise the importance of not missing church and Sunday School.

THANKS

Thanks to the small group of men who over the summer cleaned, repaired and painted the extensive wall that surrounds the rectory. It looks very good - a job well done.

HARVEST ENVELOPE

We are aware that as a parish we have to spend much money on maintaining property and maintaining the life of our own parish. At the same time we cannot just live to ourselves and our Christian faith requires us to give to the needs of others. Over the last years because of heavy expenditure our giving to missions and charities has decreased. In order to further this giving the special Harvest envelope will like last

year go towards missions and charities. Please therefore give thought to your donation as you use this envelope.

GRANTS

Small grants from the Gore Trust are available to people either entering third level education or already in it. These are yearly grants and those who have received this grant before should apply again if they are still in education. Please send a letter or email to the Parish Treasurer at the Parish Office stating name and address, college being attended and course being followed. Closing date for grant requests - 30th September.

THE GRACE OF GIVING

We are grateful to all those who continue to faithfully support the mission and ministry of our church family - that we have managed to provide the resources to maintain all this work is highly commendable.

Recently we have had to undertake 2 costly projects at St Patrick's much of which work centred around the tower. The Renovation Fund along with grants has managed to finance these. Now we have to undertake major renovation work at the rectory but again we are trusting that we can manage to do this within the Renovation Fund budget.

The General Fund continues to remain a concern. While giving to the Renovation Fund has kept up, that to the General Fund has fallen. Over the period of the first 8 months of the year the giving to this fund last year was £98,230 while this year it has dropped to £88,689.

If there are those who over this last year have fallen behind in their giving we would encourage them to make this up.

PRAYER SPACE

In St Patrick's the north transept is very seldom used and is almost a 'dead space' which tends to attract clutter. We would like to put part of it to better use. We have permission and the Select Vestry has agreed to turn it into an open area which can be used for various purposes but especially for prayer. The area is to be redesigned with 2 pews being removed and another turned around. The area will be carpeted with a table forming a focus point and suitable chairs installed. We are grateful to a parishioner whose generous donation will cover all costs.

THE RECTOR'S FAREWELL

The Rector's final service will be held on Sunday 1st November at 11.00 am in St Patrick's. This will be a combined parish act of worship, which will adequately reflect the rich diversity and quality of worship which Canon Lloyd has nurtured during his ministry in

Ballymena. After the service we will retire to the church hall where we can enjoy a time of fellowship with the rector and with one another, also a bite to eat, followed by the presentation of gifts and a few speeches. It is hoped that as many parishioners as possible will be able to attend as this provides us with a unique opportunity to show our appreciation for his faithful service, his wise counsel and his thoughtful leadership.

We have decided that we should give every parishioner the opportunity to contribute, in a tangible way, to the Rector's 'farewell presentation'. We appreciate the significant financial contribution which you already make to the running of our parish, but we know that you will want to make a contribution to this very special 'collection'. Hopefully we will be in a position to make a presentation, which appropriately recognises the long and faithful service of ministry from which we have all benefited.

Contribution envelopes can be found in the delivered magazines and at the back of each of our three churches. They may be returned via the collection plate, given to any Church Warden or left in the Church Office.

Thank you in anticipation of your support and we look forward to seeing you at the Rector's final service for our parish.



The Curate's Letter

Winter is coming!

After a poor summer with lots of rain and dull days winter, which does not seem to have been very far away this year is fast approaching - local farmers have stated that the harvest of crops so far has been poor not as much silage and hay for the animals to see them through the winter - many farmers saying that yields are lower than last year.

Winter and the shorter days bring less light. We draw our curtains and stay indoors more often during this period than when the days are longer. It is the time of the year when we talk of how the weather effects our moods- Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) a term often used by medical professionals to diagnose the rise in people presenting with poor mental health over the winter months.

Mental illness can affect anyone! It is estimated that 1 in 4 adults experience at least one diagnosable mental health problem in any one year (source: The Office of National Statistics Psychiatric Morbidity Report 2001).

Some mental illnesses are linked to certain types of people who can be more at risk, due to contributing factors such as their age, gender, economic status, or other life issues such as disability or substance dependency.

Mental health problems can develop at different stages during an individual's life. For example Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is evident from very early on when children start school as their behaviour can be compared to others of the same age.

On the other hand conditions such as Schizophrenia can develop in late teens to early twenties for men and early to late twenties in women. There are no set rules as to whom mental illness affects, if often depends on the individual and their life circumstances and events, in much the same way as physical illness. Experiences during childhood such as trauma or abuse can increase the risk of mental illness by changing someone's behaviour and thinking patterns. Life events, stress and the strength of our support networks, together with our age or gender, all combine in determining our mental health; that is why anyone can potentially develop a mental health problem.

Most mental health professionals believe that there are a variety of contributing factors to the onset of a mental illness. Studies have found that there are physical, social, environmental and psychological causes for mental illness. Reference - www.mindwise.org

A study of depression among older Europeans has found that joining a religious organisation is more beneficial than charity work, sport or education in improving their mental health.

The surprising findings from a study by the Erasmus MC and the London School of Economics and Political Science also reveal that political and community organisations actually have a detrimental impact on the mental health of older Europeans on a long term basis.

In a study of 9000 Europeans aged 50+ over a four-year period, researchers at Erasmus MC and LSE looked at different levels of social activity and how they influenced people's moods.

LSE epidemiologist Dr Mauricio Avendano said the only activity associated with sustained happiness was attending a church, synagogue or mosque.

"The church appears to play a very important social role in keeping depression at bay and also as a coping mechanism during periods of illness in later life. It is not clear to us how much this is about religion per se, or whether it may be about the sense of belonging and not being socially isolated," he said.

Previous studies have found that people who are involved in the church, clubs, sport, political groups and voluntary activities enjoy better mental health than the rest of the population. Reference LSE - Research Religion best way to beat depression - press release 4th August 2015.

As the new church year of activities approaches and groups and organisations start up again now is a good time to think about doing something different this year.

Look after yourself by allowing a few hours each week to attend an activity that you are interested in - take part in something new - come to a coffee morning, chat and meet new friends or volunteer to help out with some of the organisations.


As a church our aim is to follow the teachings of our Lord and support people in our community and beyond.

In order to be able to give support we need ourselves to be as well as we can be, both physically and mentally - we need to look after ourselves first if we are to enable other people to achieve and overcome any issues that they are facing.

So think about this - winter is coming - it will be cold with long dark nights approaching.

Everything is starting up again in the church over the next few weeks - you can stay in and hide away until spring - or use the opportunity to do yourself some good - improve your mental health and help others as you make new friends by joining in one of the activities within the church.

After all research has stated and proven, 'Religion best way to beat depression'.



On Thursday 11th June the Choir finished off the season with a meal, fellowship and a bit of craic in Leighinmohr House Hotel.










NEPAL

Ady Camacho

Parishioners will remember Ady who spent 3 months in the parish. Working in Nepal from 2009 he returned last year to his native Philippines. He recently wrote of his year at home:-



Nepal

'One year has passed and I have been busy visiting, reporting and updating the ministry to the street children in Kathmandu. I met many people, gained friends and had a great bonding time with the District Ministry Supervisor, church leaders and their congregations. I have been blessed by their generosity, kindness and hospitality. Bonding time with my family will be treasured and I had opportunity to bring back my niece and her daughter to Christ. Meeting with my Pasay City Alliance Church family I had a great time'.

Ady returned to Kathmandu on 16th August and is settling back into life there. He has been blessed in being able to find suitable accommodation and is looking forward to his second term of mission work in Nepal. We were able to send him some donations to get him established and he is very grateful for these.

Jiri Hospital

This was where our parish team worked last November and it suffered greatly due to the second earthquake. We were able to send £1900 to the hospital from the money collected in the parish. Most of the original hospital buildings were unusable and the hospital is in the process of trying to provide new buildings. Dr Roshan Khatri, in charge of the hospital, has been under much pressure but did respond recently to an email.

'Regarding funding we have received a very generous and timely contribution from our friends in Ireland. We are very thankful to them. I have not been able to access the Internet very often and communicate with them and my personal computer and office computer were damaged in the earthquake. We are planning to write them an official gratitude letter on behalf of the hospital management'.

Balkhu Slum

Again this is where parish members have worked and where a relationship with Pastor Daniel was built. The school we worked in was demolished when redevelopment work was being undertaken and then the next school Pastor Daniel established was destroyed in the earthquake. He now has managed to construct another school and writes:-

'We like to thank you very much for your prayer encouragement. We are fine here and everything is doing good after the big earthquake. We were able to build a new school and this time it is made of metal. We are thinking that if you are planning to visit Nepal we like to invite you to our school to draw some kind of sketch outside and even inside also and some bible words on the wall - some kind of painting which can show a moral lesson'.

INDIA

St Columba's Hospital

You might remember that our friends Dr Pushpa Dass and Shirley Iman, who were the great drivers behind the work of the hospital over many



years, stepped down from their positions some time ago. We have been able to keep in contact with them and also with the new hospital administrator Pryanka Sanga. She has been in charge for over a year and despite the many problems has kept the hospital functioning. She is energetic and a hard worker and has undertaken some improvement works around the hospital partly funded by money from Ireland. These included the provision of another bore well and the repair of the Out Patient ward roof which was always leaking. The shortage of doctors remains a problem - there are just 2 residential doctors and 2 consultant doctors who undertake some sessions in the hospital. They have also the services of a paediatrician doctor when there are difficulties with babies after birth. Pryanka writes:-

'I am really thankful for the love, care and support that friends did for St Columba's hospital. I am also thankful for the trust friends showed upon me. I strongly wish to see you some day and I pray God to plan your visit soon to Hazaribagh'.

Pushpa and Shirley are in the process of moving into their retirement home - part of which we prepared when we were last in Hazaribagh.

Overseas team

The Ballymena Church Members Forum are planning to develop its partnership with Habitat for Humanity by sending a volunteer team overseas from Ballymena in 2016. An initial meeting will be held in Montgomery's on Saturday 12th September at 10 am when Patrick Marshall from Habitat will be speaking.




Prayer Ministry is available each Sunday in St Patrick's after Morning and Evening Prayer.


