

STILL ACTIVE CLUB





The Curate's Letter

'Chimps are Us'

I was reading a good newspaper article (in the bath) recently which reported that ethologists (that's scientists who study animal behaviour to you and me) are puzzled by the behaviour of chimpanzees when faced by waterfalls. Not something that you have ever considered, perhaps, unless you are an ethologist, and maybe not even then.

It has been noticed that chimpanzees who come upon spectacular water-falls stop what they are doing and perform a display of rhythmical dancing, swaying, stamping and throwing rocks for up to 15 minutes. What is going on here? Jane Goodall, an ethologist, argues that this is a kind of early primitive religious ritual, and that primates have religious feelings when faced by something awesome and magnificent. Interesting. Other ethologists Donovan Schaefer and Stewart Guthrie argue that chimpanzees see the world as alive - when they come before a magnificent waterfall they are awed, and frightened, because they see the waterfall as a living, even dangerous thing that has to be treated very carefully.

Don't be feeling that you are too different to a chimp! Theologian Rudolph Otto wrote a famous and groundbreaking book in the 1920's, which has never been out of print, called *The Idea of the Holy*. Otto says that the most basic human response to the sheer awesomeness of the living God has to be fear - fear of something living and so powerful that it might even be dangerous, and a tremendous sense of awe. That friends is quite the right attitude to take. Ultimately, all other things we may feel about God (gratitude for all that he gives us, and does for us) are secondary to this feeling. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews (10.31) understands this well, he (or she) says, "It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God."

Animals too, I think, have religious feelings, these smart chimps recognise something awesome when they see it, just like we do, and nothing is more awesome than God. God is greater than any waterfall found in nature, because God is bigger even than nature itself. So be grateful to God for all his acts of loving kindness, but most of all be deeply aware of your own smallness compared to his awesome size and power.



The rector took as the theme for his address some of the lyrics from that famous football song 'You'll never walk alone' linking these with God's glorious promises in John chapter 14 and it was so fitting that our final hymn beautifully built on this theme 'Abide with me'.
