

Rectory Ramblings

At 11 am, on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the First World War formally ended. Over the years, this has been enshrined in the two minute silence at eleven o'clock on November 11th. At the Cenotaph Remembrance Service, Royalty, Politicians and the Armed Services lay poppy wreaths to remember those who died, fighting for our nation and in many churches on the nearest Sunday to WW1's 11/11/11 congregations will hold their own individual, sombre Acts of Remembrance.

Who can fail to be moved at the sight of poppy petals falling from the ceiling at the British Legion Annual Festival of Remembrance? Even the Tower of London has been immortalized by that art installation of ceramic poppies 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red', immortalizing all those who gave their lives in wars. The Last Post is played and the solemn words read.

'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them'

The first minute of silence is to remember those who gave their lives and died. The second minute is for us to remember those who came back from war and all the families affected by loss and the impact of fighting. But why is remembering so important?

A former soldier was arrested by detectives investigating the fatal shooting of fourteen people on Bloody Sunday 1972. That was a key trigger in three decades of violence that we remember as 'The Troubles' in Northern Ireland. Even more recently another serving soldier was arrested for illegally obtaining and stashing weapons for 'the other side', in Larne of all places. 'Spotlight' is a film picturing the Boston Globe investigations into child abuse cases in the Roman Catholic Church, which led to the publication of horrific details of what some priests did in America, Ireland and throughout the world, not to mention the terrible consequences for the innocent victims of awful crimes.

I asked a friend what he was doing one afternoon and he told me that he was visiting his mother in a care home. He then said, "She used to be my mother." One of the sad effects of early dementia is a loss of memory. Often someone vividly remembers details of their childhood and what they did, but they have no recollection of who you are and what they did ten minutes ago; never mind what happened yesterday. Tony Blair once visited one such care facility and he asked an elderly woman whether she knew who he was, she replied, "I don't know, but the nurse at the desk will tell you."

Memory is not just about who we are and what life we lead. It is about what makes us who we are as individuals; it defines us and all that has happened. God told the Israelites to remember that they were once slaves in Egypt and that the Lord God freed them. Nations, like individuals, need to remember the price so many paid for our freedom. We need to remember what we were, to appreciate fully what we are now. Remembering correctly, hopefully, means we will not repeat the sins of our fathers. We should emulate the good lives and examples others have set us. The apostle Paul would express it, "Remember and copy me, as I remember Christ and copy Him." Remembering changes and affects our today and every day. 1 Cor 11:1.

LEPROSY MISSION

At the end of November, I close the books and advise the Select Vestry of the amount donated in the little red boxes for the year. This is then passed on to The Leprosy Mission NI (TLM NI) as part of the parish's contribution to missions and charities.

Over the past year, TLM NI sent a total of £296,909 to hospitals and projects in five countries. In Ethiopia, funds were used to provide accommodation for 521 rural patients who otherwise would have had to travel to Addis Ababa. Funds were contributed to Shahdara and Purulia Hospitals in India to treat children and adults with leprosy.

TLM NI continues to support Anandaban Hospital and clinics across Nepal where 25,000 were treated including 5,000 affected by the earthquake.

Hospitals in Nigeria have been supported through feeding programmes and medical supplies. In Tanzania, 26 houses have been completed in the village of Samaria and a water pump has also been installed.

Your support and help is always appreciated by TLM NI as it has made a difference to thousands of different individuals across the world.

Action Cancer 'Big Bus'

The Men's Fellowship group have arranged for the Action Cancer 'Big Bus', to be in the grounds of St Patrick's Parish Hall on Friday 25th November 2016, from 9.30 am - 4.30 pm. This will allow for a number of FREE health checks for the men and women of the parish and the wider community. The following appointments can be made:

- Men's M.O.T. HEALTH CHECK: Appointments are available for anyone aged 16+. Each appointment will last around 25 minutes and can include blood pressure, glucose and cholesterol, lung function and body composition analysis.
- **BREAST SCREENING:** Appointments available for ladies aged 40 49 and 70+. Those aged between 50 69 are excluded as this service is currently free on the NHS for that age group. Early detection via breast screening saves lives.

Appointments can be made easily online at <u>www.actioncancer.org/appointments</u>, or call the appointment line on 028 9080 3344. Please read and be aware of the instructions and guidelines provided by Action Cancer during your booking.

Ballyclug Notes




7.30 pm through until 8 pm Saturday 5th November. There will be musical worship interludes every two hours.

Remembrance Sunday service for me is a very special time when we come to remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away in the cause of justice and freedom. I deeply respect these brave men and women and believe that it is not only today that we should be remembering them but every day.

I was reading an article referring to the history of the Poppy Appeal. The red petals of the poppy have become a familiar sight each November but do you know why we wear poppies to mark Remembrance Day?

Poppies were first suggested as a symbol of remembrance in the U.S.A. by Miss Moina Michael in November 1918 and it was adopted by the American Legion in 1920. In August 1921 Madame Guerin introduced her poppies which were made by French-American charity widows for the British Legion. The next suitable occasion for a poppy-united appeal was Armistice Day and so the first poppy appeal was born. They didn't know if it would work, but ordered nine million poppies just in case.

On the day itself, the first poppy was bought in London a few seconds after midnight. From that moment it was a seller's market: the poppies were on sale at an official price of three pence but before breakfast single petals were selling in the Smithfield Market for £5. All day long motor cars fetched poppies and crate after crate was emptied until supplies ran out. A message from Queen Mary brought sellers to Buckingham Palace, but hearing that poppies were in short supply she bought only two. A basket of poppies auctioned at Christie's raised nearly £500.

The first appeal raised £106,000 - nearly £30 million in today's terms and all the poppies were supplied from France. In 1922 the 'Poppy Factory' was established in the United Kingdom to keep costs down, and employed just five disabled ex-Servicemen to make the poppies. Three times as many poppies were ordered for the next appeal and it made £204,000 with lower overheads.

Please note that poppies were 'sold' when the appeal started, but charity legislation now requires them to be distributed in return for donations. Ninety years later the Royal British Legion is still making poppies and what a wonderful work they do. The poppy appeal is more important than ever. It helps us remember not just World Wars 1 and 2 but all the wars that have happened - and are still happening - since those two wars. It reminds us to think of all the people whose lives have been affected even if we don't know them. It also reminds us of how we can help by buying a poppy and wearing it with pride.

Why are they selling poppies, Mummy, selling poppies in town today? The poppies, child, are flowers of love, for the men who marched away. But why have they chosen a poppy, Mummy, why not a beautiful rose? Because, my child, men fought and died in fields where the poppies grow. But why are the poppies so red, Mummy, why are the poppies so red? Red is the colour of blood my child. The blood our soldiers shed. The heart of the poppy is black, Mummy, why does it have to be black? Black, my child, is the symbol of grief; for the men who never came back. But why are you crying so, Mummy, are your tears giving you pain? My tears are my fears for you, my child, for the world is forgetting again.

A CMS Ireland META is a *Mission Experience Team Abroad*. METAs provide opportunities for individuals in Ireland to visit one of our partners in another part of the world, to experience life and work there and to sample something of a different culture. METAs can be a great encouragement to our partners and our hope is that they will inspire, challenge and enthuse participants to engage more deeply in global mission. METAs involve training prior to the visit, the visit itself and some follow-up in Ireland after the visit has taken place.

Where:	Madi West Nile Diocese, Uganda
When:	Saturday 12th - 26th August 2017 (14 days)
Team Size:	Up to 10 people

Cost: £2,000 per person, this includes training, flights, visas, accommodation and food. It will not include the cost of your vaccinations.

What will the team be doing? The team will focus on:

- 1. Children's Centre Refurbishment helping with painting and finishing touches
- 2. Children's Ministry working alongside local leaders to run a one week kids club
- 3. There will be opportunities to help with youth and women's ministry, and wider church activities


How will the team prepare?
