I wonder if you can remember what happened way back on 20th July 1969 (without using technology)! Some of you will have guessed the answer at once - it was the day two men from earth first walked on the moon. I can clearly remember being glued to the very poor pictures on our TV as a 9 year old boy.

But I wonder if you know this part of that amazing story, Buzz Aldrin was an Elder in a Presbyterian Church and knowing that he was about to take part in the event that would be history making he wanted to be prepared. Prepared even on the moon to put God first. So he brought a small vial of communion wine and a consecrated communion wafer with him into space.

I'll let Buzz take over in his own words, "I opened the little packages which contained the bread and wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine slowly curled and gracefully came up the side of the cup. Then I read scripture. 'I am the vine, you are the branches. Whosoever abides in Me will bring forth much fruit. Apart from Me you can do nothing.' I ate the tiny wafer and drank the wine. I gave thanks for the intelligence and spirit that had brought two young pilots to the Sea of Tranquility. It was interesting for me to think that the very first food and drink eaten by humans on the moon was Holy Communion." [From the original Mission Report by Eric Metaxas].

Talk about putting God first! I wonder where you will venture this summer? I wonder if as families and individuals we will be as prepared and show the same remarkable Christian attitude as Buzz Aldrin - the desire and ability to put God first. #### CONGRATULATIONS

Congratulations to our Lay Reader Jim Perry who was recognized in the Queen's Birthday Honour's list.



The following appeared in the Ballymena Guardian on 22nd June -

Mr James Perry has been awarded an MBE for his services to the community in Ballymena.

Mr Perry is a well recognized face locally, especially in Ahoghill where he has worked with the 'In Bloom' team for many years.

He is currently the Clerk to the Lieutenancy of County Antrim, hav-

ing served in the role of High Sheriff in 2016 and is the chair of the Northern Ireland Social Care Council. He is also Chair of Ulster Supported Employment Limited (USEL). During the last 35 years, James has served on 5 School Boards of Governors, including a period of almost 10 years as Chair of the Board at Ballymena Academy, where he currently acts as Honorary Treasurer of the Old Pupils' Association.

Married to Patricia, with two children Sarah and Christopher, James said: "I am absolutely delighted to receive this award. I was overwhelmed and totally surprised when I first received notification and I am particularly pleased that the citation refers to 'services' to my home town. It is a great honour to be recognized in this way."

#### MASONIC SERVICE

The Seven Towers and Massereene District Charity Divine Service was held in St Patrick's Parish Church on Sunday 14th May. The Reverend Mark McConnell officiated and later received a letter of thanks from the Honorary Secretary stating that £928 had been raised at the service for Masonic charities. £100 was also donated to church funds.

# A view from the pew

Quite often I think of all the folk that used to sit in the pews or members of the clergy that I have read about and wonder how would they have spoken, was it in clipped sentences and how tall were they?

One such rector that I always think about at this time of year, particularly, when the flag goes up on 30th of June, each year to commemorate the Battle of the Somme is Dr Arthur E Ross. He first came to the parish in 1894 as a curate and returned in 1912 as rector following the untimely death of the rector the Rev Noel Austin.

At the outbreak of the First World War he applied to become an army chaplain, his papers finally coming through from the War Office at the end of 1915 and shortly afterwards in early



1916 he left the parish to take up his duties as an Army Chaplain. He quickly rose to the rank of major, and like most of the clergy he helped the medics to attend to the wounded and dying. He was mentioned in dispatches in January 1917 for bravery at the Battle of the Somme and was awarded the Military Cross and a Bar was to follow in January 1918.

His citation reads, 'For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried in wounded under circumstances of great danger and difficulty. He ended by helping to carry a fellow officer for over four hours. He was the means of saving many lives, and inspired the stretcherbearers to work to the utmost limit of their endurance.'

His wife a famous British Ladies Golf Champion and author at the turn of the 20th century survived her husband the then Bishop of Tuam by some forty years.

# Secretary's Notes

As we look forward to the summer and the holiday season I'd like to let you know what we hope to have accomplished during the quieter weeks when regular use of the parish facilities stops for July and August.

As you probably know already the equipment storage shed at St Patrick's, Ballyclug was recently broken into and grounds keeping equipment stolen. In response we plan to have the alarm system there extended to cover the outbuildings as well as the church to try to deter any future repeat of this theft.

At St Columba's the Select Vestry intends to improve the exterior lighting at the front of the church to make it safer during the dark of the winter nights. We are considering installation of a street-lamp pole at the corner of the car park which will carry new flood-lighting to illuminate the car park and front steps. In the near future we also hope to have the good doors which were reclaimed from Harryville Chapel when it was demolished hung in the front hall at St Columba's.

At Castle Street the action will be centred on the halls. We are still told repeatedly that the wifi signal is unreliable through the halls, so it is planned to extend the cabling and add extender boosters in several places to help overcome that problem. There will be the addition of a display screen in the entrance hall too, an idea that has been trying to come to fruition since before Canon Lloyd retired but is now at last becoming a reality. Hopefully those two pieces of work will improve the usefulness of the halls for everyone, but we are also considering some re-modelling to the 'Youth Room' which will benefit the Youth Club and improve the facilities they have to work with. That work will be entirely within that room so I dare say most of us will never see it, but we will take away some out of date features of the room and create a more open space with much better storage. For anyone who isn't sure of the location of the Youth Room, it is the room beyond the Parish Office, under and behind the stage of the main hall. Well as we all know it is much easier to make plans than to carry them out, and that list, short though it is on paper, will be I imagine more than enough to actually try to get done before September arrives and all the regular weekly activities start up again around the parish. I hope that you'll be forgiving if some of it doesn't quite come off as quickly as we'd all like it too.

Finally can I ask you to spare a thought for the rector and Rev Dennis too. Simple maths suggests that their workload will each increase by about half now that Rev John has left to take up his new parish at Muckamore. We all wish him every success tackling the challenges of learning a lot of new names and faces and getting to know his new congregations - we will miss him here very much.

I hope those of you managing a holiday away have a good time and safe travel.

As ever, we have lost a few of our collectors; not through a lack of willingness to help but rather through age, ill-health and other church commitments. # Bereavement Course

Many people are in contact with a church soon after they have been bereaved - even if they are not regular churchgoers. Churches are usually able to support bereaved people well before and immediately after the funeral - but sometimes do not have the time, resources or skills to help them in the weeks and months afterwards. The Bereavement Care Awareness Course has been produced as part of Care for the Family's bereavement training for churches to support those in their community who are coping with the heartache of the death of a loved one.

The aim is to develop knowledge, skills and understanding of how churches can be involved in providing appropriate levels of on-going support after the funeral, for people who have been bereaved following the death of a close family member or friend.

Those attending the course will:

- Gain basic information of the impact bereavement has in people's lives and the different ways in which individuals commonly respond.
- Have had the opportunity to reflect on your own experience of bereavement.
- Be able to identify the basic needs of bereaved people.
- Be able to identify key factors in providing effective support.
- Be able to identify the skills, structure and safeguards needed to provide appropriate levels of support to bereaved people within the context and boundaries of what might be possible within your church.

- Know the questions to be addressed in considering whether it is appropriate for you/your church to develop or be involved in sup porting bereaved people.
- Gain information on models of bereavement support that churches can provide.
- Gain information on the range and types of bereavement support services available locally and nationally to be able to signpost bereaved people to them.

The Bereavement Course will take place on **Saturday 30th September 10 - 4 pm** - anyone who wants to attend please speak to Lucy.

# The Curate's Letter

## Don't lose the bap

In Northern Ireland we often, for some reason, refer to our head as a baked good - 'yer bap', 'yer scone', 'yer loaf'. Maybe someone can explain why. But when we say 'don't lose the bap' we mean don't lose your head or don't lose your temper.

Keeping our tempers in check is a 'biggie' for many of us! The way others behave or the circumstances we face in life can tip us over emotionally and we can react badly. And more often than not we can allow ourselves to say things that are hurtful and unloving to those around us. It may be with our family members, our friends, someone from our church family or even a workmate, when we get upset and say something that is not only ungodly but deeply hurtful. The old nursery rhyme 'sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me', most of us know to be a rubbish and totally untrue saying.

In Matthew 15:18, Jesus says that 'what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this defiles a person'.

Sometimes people in this world can do things that are wrong to us, they can steal our car parking space, they can push in on a queue, they can cut us up whilst driving. And although there can be a justified satisfaction to giving someone a good tongue lashing when we feel we are in the right, the words which come out are always a sign of the condition of our heart. Road rage is one thing, but a lot of damage can be done in the home, to our friends, to our



church family, when we are not mindful of the words that come out of our mouth. The Bible tells us that what comes out of our mouths is very telling indeed. It tells us what condition our heart is in. When we speak words that don't honour God, it comes from a heart that is not where it should be.

As the temperature increases outside this summer, don't allow your temper to get the better of you. After all this is just a sign of what can be going on in our hearts, and it is getting our hearts right before God that can be the best form of anger management. God wants to do business with each of us, in our hearts, the place where He looks first. So lets be mindful of the condition of our hearts. Read God's word, pray to God and ask him to make our hearts more like His. Search your heart and seek repentance before God for where you might let Him down as you deal with other people.

If you know you have a problem with your temper, why not try memorising a verse like Colossians 3:8 [But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips] and ask the Lord in prayer to bring it to mind when you feel like you are about to lose your temper. So don't lose your bap - allow God to help you respond to the challenges of life as a follower of Christ should.
