



Any donations raised will be split equally between the Alzheimer's Society and Youth Work within the parish.

So please kindly take the time to look down the backs of sofas, in drawers, in your cars (where you may have a round pound that you would use as a trolley token). In savings jars or piggy banks, or even under the bed where the rainy day fund is.

Have a rummage around in those old trousers and jacket pockets, purses and wallets.

If you're a parent why not have the children do a treasure hunt around the house, they can all be pirates for a few hours.

There are 1.5 bn pound coins in circulation and an equal number of new ones being produced.

I might point out that this is not the only Parish having this trouble, most parishes now are in the same position, no one wants to commit to ringing twice on a Sunday. How do I know, because a lot of us ringers talk about ways and means to attract the 'Young Ones' and that also includes the under 40's.

YOU don't have to read music, all you have to do is be able to count to eight for that's the most we can ring now. It will take you, depending on how quick you can master the bell, about three months and you too could be ringing for some of the most magical occasions in the church and public calendar. 

A warm welcome will be given to any new faces or those who haven't been for a while. If anyone requires transport please give me a call. Look forward to seeing you all.



Our Men's Fellowship group got together again in September after the summer break and are now planning the way ahead. On a monthly basis we are continuing to work through



WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY AND WEEKLY PRAYER GROUP -SCRIPTURE UNION 150 YEARS OLD








The Curate's Letter

Time flies when you're having fun

My family and I have now been in Ballymena for over a year and it certainly is the case that time flies when you are having fun, or just plain busy! It has been a hectic year with a steep learning curve for a curate, but it has been a very encouraging one.



Time does fly by, this is 2017 and we are now well into autumn and hurtling towards Christmas. Some of you will have noticed some festive goods starting to appear in the shops - No! Too soon!

The Psalmist says, in Psalm 35:15, 'My times are in your hands.' How we use our time (as it flies by) as a Christian, for anything in our life, should be approached, just like all of our thinking, in a radical way compared to the world around us. As a Christian we are to spend our time, govern our time, with a focus on how our Lord would have us spend it. Prayer, for example, is something that the majority of the world would consider a complete waste of time - "Why pray when you could be just getting on with it?" Well the point is we shouldn't want to be 'getting on' with anything unless it is what God wants us to be doing. Seeking God's will in how we are to spend our time is what we should all be doing as Christians.

Reading God's word, and taking the time to prayerfully consider how we are to spend our time in light of it, might be considered another waste of time by some, but to the Christian it is essential. Psalm 119:105, 'Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.' A Christianity that

doesn't take prayer seriously and doesn't take the word of God seriously, and doesn't give over regular time to either is in deep danger.

As well as praying and reading God's word, we are of course to do his will - as it says in James 2, faith without works is dead. We are to give of our time and resources to serve God and others in need. This is the part that others can see, but that doesn't mean it isn't time well spent - serving God in practical ways, sacrifice is also essential to our growth as Christians and the growth of God's kingdom.

Our times are to be in God's hands. In the opening lines of the Lord's prayer there is 'Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done', not our kingdom, not our will, His! On a personal level, God is seeking to make each of us more like Jesus. We are to spend our time helping with that process, by spending time focused on God, praying to Him, handing over all our anxieties to him, asking for his help, reading God's word for His direction in our lives, and serving God in practical ways in our lives.




'The Way' Youth Fellowship

Roberta was born in July 1928. She was the the youngest of 4 children born to Robert and Annie Hanley in Ballymena.
