



Famous Prayers

A miner's son who became the darling of the Reformation - monk, philosopher, lecturer and doctrinal revolutionary. The next prayer in our 'Famous Prayers' series comes from Martin Luther. His stance on faith matters was long in the making. He wrote prolifically and his German

translation of the Bible is highly regarded and helped in the development of the German language as we know it. The Wittenberg Theses sparked a century of debate, thought, prayer and writing, leading to the formation of the Protestant Church. Here is a beautiful prayer written by Luther.



The Empty Vessel

Behold, Lord, an empty vessel that needs to be filled.

My Lord, fill it.

I am weak in the faith; strengthen me.

I am cold in love; warm me and make me fervent, that my love may go out to my neighbour.

I do not have a strong and firm faith:

at times I doubt and am unable to trust you altogether.

O Lord, help me.

Strengthen my faith and trust in you.

In you, I have sealed the treasure of all I have.

I am poor, you are rich and come to be merciful to the poor.

I am a sinner: you are upright.

With me, there is an abundance of sin; in you is the fullness of righteousness.

Therefore, I will remain with you, of whom I can receive, but to whom I may not give. **Amen.**



The Curate's Letter

Access to God

I was at a meeting recently where I was asked to describe how I was feeling in one word! Never an easy thing to do, why not try it for yourself now, how are you feeling in one word? Anyway after a few moments to think about it I came up with the word 'reliant'. When I thought about how I was doing, I felt I was very reliant, over the past few years especially, on help from God. We are always reliant on God, even though we don't realise it or feel it, but for me I have been regularly running to God to help get me through.

It might seem a bit weak, being so reliant on God, but it is a good place to be. As a Christian it is a great reassurance to know that through Jesus we have direct access to God. And when we know that we have a God who is full of compassion, who knows everything we are going through, and who loves and cares for each one of us - then who better to turn to?

Furthermore scripture tells us that Jesus continually intercedes for those who come to God through him: 'He is always living to make petition to God and intercede with him and intervene for them' (Hebrews 7:25). Robert Murray M'Cheyne wrote, 'If I could hear Christ praying for me in the next room, I would not fear a million enemies. Yet distance makes no difference. He is praying for me'.



God wants us to go to him, through Jesus we have direct access, so use it, and be reassured Jesus even prays for us too as we turn to God.

Following on from our previous years success, we will be carrying out a charity fund raiser for our chosen charity this year – The Lily Foundation.

The Lily Foundation is the UK's leading charity dedicated to fighting mitochondrial (mito) disease. Their mission is to support people whose lives are affected by the condition, raise awareness and fund research into its prevention, diagnosis and treatment. 10 million people in the UK suffer from diseases in which mitochondrial dysfunction is believed to be involved, and every day in the UK a baby is born that will develop mitochondrial disease. The Lily Foundation is fighting to change this, with their ultimate aim being to one day find a cure. Mitochondrial disease is a complex condition that affects people medically in a wide variety of ways.


We have chosen this charity as Ann's cousin's young 3 year old son, Alex has been diagnosed with this disease. He was born a healthy baby, but without warning he started taking epileptic seizures aged 7 months. That began his journey of endless tests, scans & appointments. After nearly 18 months from him having his 1st seizure, it was confirmed from a muscle biopsy that he had Mito. The term Mitochondrial Disease, refers not to one specific illness but to a number of diseases caused by faulty Mitochondria. Alex currently suffers from Epilepsy, Developmental Delay, Left Ventricular Hypertrophy, Bilateral Pes Planus, Joint Hypermobility & Sensory Ataxia. This is because his Mitochondria (we all have them) don't store / produce energy correctly. Without the right amount of energy, his cells cannot do their job and they stop performing. Mito is a complex disease that affects each person differently. It can occur at any age and it can affect almost any part of the body. People with MITO are immunocompromised and illness / infection can cause disease progression. There is **NO CURE** for Mitochondrial Disease and it is treated symptomatically. It can be fatal and is considered life limiting at best. It can also be inherited or be sporadic. No one is exempt.

Alex is a charismatic, happy little boy. He brings a lot of joy to those around him and he has huge determination to enjoy life to the full. We don't know what lies ahead for him, but what we do know is we need to help to find a cure. Alex's mum Hazel and dad James are currently fundraising for The Lily Foundation, and this year we have decided to help them by collecting 20 pence pieces in Smartie tubes. All proceeds will go directly to The Lily Foundation to help in their efforts to find a cure and provide other respite.
