

Not so famous prayers

The very best theologians are rarely theologians! Take the former churchwarden in a rural parish. He often struggled to get to church on time because of all the farm chores that had to be done. His rector really appreciated his extra efforts in the parish and having a chat together one Sunday after church, the churchwarden let the rector know that when the final chore was done he would always say a prayer. "Like what?" asked the rector. "Well it would go like this, Dear Lord I'm sorry to have to leave you now, but I've got to go to church".

Little did he know just how excellent his theology was or that his prayer was built on the same basis as King Solomon's great prayer of dedication of the Temple in Jerusalem. Around the Parish

CHURCH LADS' AND CHURCH GIRLS' BRIGADE

The Church Lads' and Church Girls' Brigade will mark 125 years serving the Church of Ireland this year. In 1893, two companies were established in Dublin at Christ Church, Leeson Park, and St Peter's. Another two, at St Mary's, Donnybrook and St Stephen's were added in 1894.



The first company in Belfast for St Luke's, Northumberland Street, was formed in 1895 by Curate, Rev. James Archer. Soon every diocese, other than Meath, had its CLB companies and battalions were established in Armagh, Belfast, Derry, Dublin and Limerick.

Girls units were established to work alongside CLB companies. In 1909, St Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry established a Church Girls' Brigade, followed by All Saints, Clooney and they competed annually for the Marchioness of Hamilton's Shield. St Nicholas', Cork ran a very successful CGB company alongside its CLB for several years.

The Great War had dreadful consequences for the Brigade. Companies were closed as they lost their officers and members to the war effort. When the war ended, other than St Mary's, Limerick Cathedral Company and St Nicholas', Cork, CLB and CGB, the main strength of the Brigade was to be found in the north, in the First Down, Connor and Dromore Battalion.

A successful rebuilding process took place and new CLB companies were established across Northern Ireland. With the formation of a Second Battalion, and subsequently a Third Battalion, a higher formation was required and the Ulster Regiment was formed (1945), its first Commanding Officer being Mr Samuel Waring, DCM, of Christ Church, Lisburn. New CGB companies were opened in Ballymoney, Dobbin, Grange, Ballymena, Newry, Magherafelt and Seagoe and the First Girls' Church **Brigade** Battalion was established, under the command of Mrs Margaret Twinem from Seagoe, Portadown. The CLB and CGB amalgamated in 1978.

In recent years, with the severe decline in attendances in churches and at Sunday Schools, the Brigade has experienced challenging times, losing strength in urban areas, particularly in Belfast. However, in the last five years the Brigade has worked hard, under its Commanding Officer, Melvyn Lockhart

This is the medal designed to commemorate the 125th anniversary and will be issued to all Officers and Seniors. It contains the Archbishop's Mitre and the Brigade badge. The ribbon colour is to represent the Archbishop's robes. and Development Officer, Victoria Jackson to make progress.

Companies have been enrolled or reenrolled at Aghalee, Dromore (Clogher), Drogheda, Drumurry, Killinchy, Lambeg, Christ Church, Lisburn and St Michael's, Belfast and there is interest being shown in other parishes. Approximately 400 members have been added to Brigade's strength.

As the Church Lads' and Church Girls' Brigade marks its 125th Anniversary it is in a confident and buoyant place and ready to serve our church for another 125 years at least.

The anniversary will be marked by a Parade and Service of Thanksgiving in St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh on Sunday 30th September at 3.30 pm. Special guest will be the Most Reverend Doctor Richard Clarke, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, who will dedicate a beautiful new colour in memory of former Commanding Officer Harry Anderson and present a new trophy, the Archbishop's Award, for the Champion Company of the Brigade.

A commemorative medal for junior and senior members and officers is being struck, and a colourful badge, designed by Brigade's member Lauren McClure from St Saviour's, Dobbin is being produced for younger members.

ST COLUMBA'S BEAVERS



Did you know...? The Church outgoings are approximately £3000 every month more than our income. Over the next few months in this magazine I will update you on the income and expenditure of our General Fund Account, so you can see a reflective picture of our monthly finances.

Our <u>August 2018</u> figures are as follows: Income : £12,407.04 Expenditure : £20,896.40 This leaves a deficit for the month of £-8489.36

Our <u>Year to Date</u> figures are as follows: Income : £182,430.48 Expenditure : £206,188.04 This leaves a deficit for the year to date of £-23,757.56

MESSY CHURCH


We are looking forward to holding our 1st Messy church in St Columba's on Sunday 14th October at 10.30 am.



A letter from Dublin

21st September 2018

Dear All,

This is just a short letter to thank you all for your support, kind words, encouragement, thoughts and prayers as I begin to study at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute, which is affectionately known to us as CITI. Or maybe as the pizza delivery guy calls it the Logical Institute.



Richard and I set off on Thurs-

day 6th September shortly after lunchtime, so we arrived at the college around 4.30-ish. On arrival we discovered that no one was getting their allocated rooms for the year until the next day.... but they did put us up for the night, even if Richard did have to spend the night on a make shift bed in the registrar's office!

Up early on the Friday morning for a wonderful breakfast. The food at the college is of a high standard. Then at 9 am I was off on the bus to Trinity college to register for the Masters in Theology and to collect my student card. I am looking forward to Student Discount! Back on the bus after lunch and we were back to the college just in time for our orientation of the RCB library, which is right next door to us. Then it was time for dinner and after that we had our first seminar on Safe-Guarding Trust. That saw us through until 9-ish. Richard had done a great job of unpacking for me, getting the Wi-Fi set up and making the room feel a little homelier. Saturday didn't stop either - I had 2 two-hour seminars that day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. We did get to relax a bit in the evening as this was the day all the families of the students had come down to get acquainted with each other.

And on top of these we have 3 church services a day (8.30/9 am, 5 pm and 9.15 pm) where all the students share the responsibility of taking a service.

After a weekend of playing catch up with my sleep, watching Dave at football and filling Richard and others in on what had been going on in Dublin it was finally time to be heading back down for the 2nd week of studies. It took over 4 hours from Cullybackey to CITI.

The 2nd week has not just been as stressful as the first as I now know where I am going, am establishing a routine, have mastered topping up my Leap Card (bus ticket) and am getting to grips with living in a community environment and indeed a whole new city to explore. This week will see me commissioned as a student reader and I hope to start my Sunday placement with John McClure in Muckamore. Please do keep me in your thoughts and prayers and ask God that he will equip me with the ability and skills to fulfil his purpose for my life.

Now time to get that train again back to Ballymena and hopefully catch up with some of you.


