



From the Rector

The problem of evil, "Sooner or later we must face the question in plain language. What reason have we except for our own desperate wishes to believe that God is good. Doesn't all evidence suggest exactly the opposite. What have we to set against it? We set Christ against it - but what if we are mistaken? His near last words (my God, my God why have you forsaken me) have a perfectly clear meaning. He had found that the being he called Father was horribly and infinitely different from what he had supposed. The trap so long and carefully prepared and so subtly

baited was at last sprung on the cross." Believe or believe it not the quote above does not come from an atheist or sceptic planning to shake any faith in God but from one of the greatest Christian thinkers and writers in modern times, C. S. Lewis! You can find the full text in his book *A Grief Observed* and in that book he shares what many of us battle with when we face prolonged or sudden horrors around us or in our own lives. If God is good why is that happening? In my pastoral ministry and general conversations over the past months, this question keeps emerging and while it is sim-



ply impossible to deal with the issue to satisfy each and every individual, I want to attempt over a few months to share some thoughts and general principles which I pray that you might find useful regarding the problems of evil. Perhaps a good place to start is with the question, where does evil come from? If God is perfect and in the beginning He made a perfect world and perfect people - where did it all go wrong? In any kind of trial and suffering it is only natural and human to cry out to God and each other with such a question. In creation part of our perfection is free choice or, free will. Our obedience if forced obedience, is not obedience at all! We have real choice and it is God given. But that also allows the possibility for evil. If our freedom is real it must include not only the opportunity to choose God and good but the ability to choose to deny God and choose evil. Now, and this is really key, God created the fact of freedom but we perform the acts of freedom. God made evil possible we make evil actual. The first source of evil therefore came through man's abuse of a God-given freedom. I want to break these thoughts and responses up into some bite size chunks - I hope you will find them sensible, prayerfully offered and helpful. Next time we will tackle the question "Why can't evil just be stopped?"

Famous Prayers



Use Me - Dwight L Moody

Use me then, my Saviour for whatever purpose, and in whatever way you may require. Here is my poor heart, an empty vessel; fill it with your grace. Here is my sinful and troubled soul; quicken it and refresh it with your love. Take my heart for your abode; my mouth to spread abroad the glory of your name; my love and all my powers, for the advancement of your believing people; and never suffer the steadfastness and confidence of my faith to abate; so that at all times I may be enabled from the heart to say, Jesus needs me, and I am His. **Amen.**

From Massachusetts, USA, and described by many as the first Billy Graham, Dwight L Moody moves from humble beginnings as a travelling

salesman. From the 1860's onwards, in partnership with Ira D Sankey, began their evangelistic campaigns - started what became a prolific hymn-writing duo, began an international network of Sunday Schools and Youth Ministries and began large-scale mission campaigns in both the UK and USA. It is reckoned that more than 100 mil-



lion people listened to his preaching! Not bad for a door-to-door salesman!



From the Treasurer

Our **December 2018** figures are as follows:

Income: £29,041.59
Expenditure: £25,645.21
This leaves a surplus for the month of £ 3,396.38

Our **<u>Year to Date</u>** figures are as follows:

Income: £283,705.90
Expenditure: £309,502.09
This leaves a deficit for the year to date of £-25,796.19

These figures are purely based on income and expenditure through the general CRG account and may vary when the accruals and prepayments accounts are presented at the Easter Vestry.

The Select Vestry have been concerned for some time at the ongoing build up in the deficit and have taken steps where possible to reduce the out going costs. They will continue to do this and continue to monitor and report on the financial affairs of the parish.

Did you know ... That for every recordable pound in Free Will Offerings (FWO's) if you are a taxpayer we can claim gift aid of 25 pence per pound. This means your offering can be worth up to 25% more. If you don't already gift aid, please consider it and contact Lorraine in the office for details.


THE GOOD BOOK CLUB

Christingle Service - focused on 50 years of 'Christingle Jesus the Light of the World'.

This year is a very special one for Christingle as it is 50 years since the first Christingle service for The Children's Society was held in this country, at Lincoln Cathedral on 7th December 1968. But Christingles themselves actually go back much further, and began in the Moravian Church in Germany. At a children's service in Marienborn in 1747, Bishop Johannes de Watteville looked for a simple way to explain the happiness that had come to people through Jesus. He decided to give the children a symbol to do this.

In 1968, John Pensom of The Children's Society adapted Christingle and introduced it to the Church of England. This involved children decorating an orange with a red ribbon, dried fruits, sweets and a candle to create a new visual representation of Christ, the light of the world, celebrated by the lighting of the Christingle candles.

Engage Sports - we are hoping to make up a team to take part in the Big Connor Sports Contest. If you are interested see Lucy.






The Curate's Letter


Useful to God

Oswald Chambers once said, "If you are going to be used by God, he will take you through a multitude of experiences that are not meant for you at all; they are meant to make you useful in his hands."

He joined the RUC in 1956 and after completing his training he began his active duty in Ballymena where he remained all his career apart from a short stint in Cullybackey. He served for 35 years and retired in 1990. In 1953 he met Maureen Campbell (a student at Queen's University) whom he married in 1959. They had three children - Sandra, Gordon and Valerie. The family circle grew with many grand children and great grand children. Upon retirement Albert became an active member of the RUC George Cross Association and local voluntary welfare group. He was especially proud to act as chairman of the former and also to take part in the Remembrance Day Parade at the Cenotaph in London. Albert's one life long interest was horses and he was more than happy that the 'horsey' gene was passed down through the generations. He also enjoyed golf and was a keen Manchester United fan. Albert faced his illness with bravery and humour. He never complained and often mentioned how fortunate he was to have had such a long and happy life.
