Provoked by conversations at homes and bedsides this ongoing series of thoughts on the subject of evil continues. Many struggle to come to a whole-hearted faith in God because of evil in the world. Still others struggle to come to terms with their suffering as a result of encountering evil people. If you have missed the earlier pieces in magazines, the ladies in the church office will be able to help. This time we tackle all too briefly the question of the purpose of evil - the dreaded question - why?

Why? - did our church burn down? Why? - did my son have to die? These crush the heart and soul of many and to attempt trite or general answers here is hugely disrespectful - so I won't - we can speak more into this issue when God's existence or power is denied because of the impact or existence of evil.

Just because we can perceive a godly plan or purpose in a particular experience of evil or its results does not mean that there is no godly plan or purpose. The allowing of the horrific torture and then death of the perfect Jesus Christ on the cross which was undeserved and unjustified is hard to take unless in God's greater love it will achieve something amazing - which we now know from scripture it did achieve. There may be times when God is working in and around us in a similar way - and we just can't see it yet. There is a second thought from both a medical and philosophical perspective that sees pain as a gift of God woven into our creation - which keeps us from even greater pain or suffering. Many references regarding the dangers of not being able to experience pain and the terrible and dangerous results can be given by those with leprosy, diabetes, etc. C. S. Lewis - a hero for many challenges us 'God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains. It is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world'. (The Problem of Pain 1967). We often may not be able to give an answer to the question why but can

we jump to a God-denying conclusion so quickly. Food for some thought I believe.



Once again could I please appeal to anyone who could spare an hour or two to assist in the upkeep of the graveyard to please contact me on 077 1061 8196.

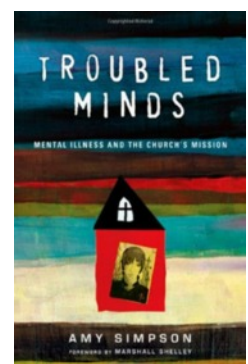

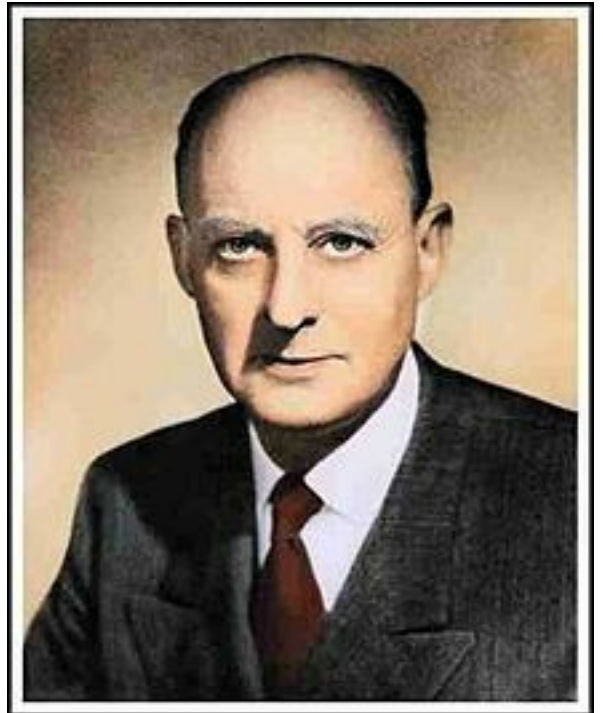


# Famous Prayers

## The Serenity Prayer

‘God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change. The courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference’. **Amen.**

Many of us will know this prayer or have a copy of it somewhere in our homes. Written by Pastor Reinhold Niebuhr as a response to the inconsolable loss and pain suffered by many during times of war. It has now attained a global recognition. It is known as the opening prayer at Alcoholics Anonymous meetings and used all over the world and has been adopted by many organisations that run change or recovery programmes.



Writing this little article between Council and European Elections and with everyone talking about the end of Theresa May as Prime Minister, perhaps we should be provoked to pray for all our elected leaders at both a national and local level. 1 Timothy 2 vs 1 and 2 reminds us, ‘I urge then first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness’.

During the dark days of WW2 supported by the then Prime Minister Winston Churchill, the nation was encouraged to stop and pray for one minute daily as Big Ben rang out at 9.00 pm. 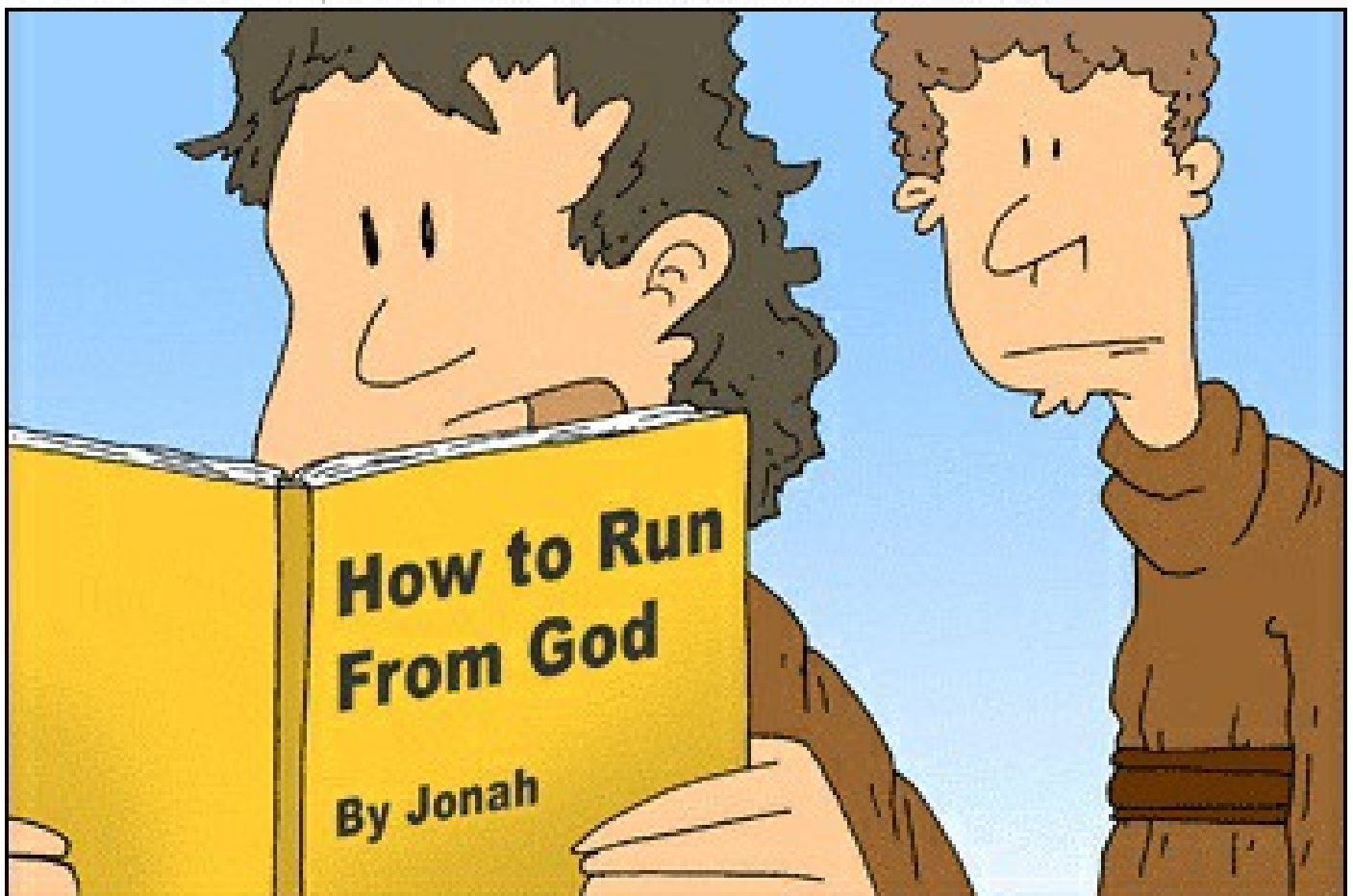

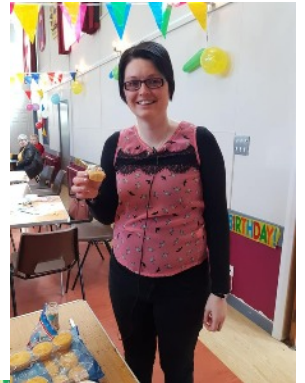

# Letter from Cork

As I write this, I am coming to the end of my first year at Theological College and have just finished a three-week placement in Cork. I chose to go to Cork as I had never been to that part of Ireland and really wanted to see how different church life was in the southern part of the island. I was placed in the Carrighrohane group of parishes. Like our own parish the union is comprised of 3 churches - St Peter's in Carrighrohane, St Senan's Inniscarra and Church of the Resurrection in Blarney. They also have a Sunday morning service in the

Parish Centre that is a contemporary style service plus Messy Church once a month. Excitedly they are embarking on an ambitious programme to redevelop an old gun store in Ballincollig into a community focused worship space and Parish Centre. This is a parish that has a huge vision of how ministry and mission will develop for the next generation. Their

mission statement states, 'mission is to be an authentic open community of all ages and stages: making whole-life disciples who live and share the gospel of Jesus through praying, playing and learning together and worshipping God passionately'.

During my time here I had the privilege of worshipping alongside

the parish community throughout Holy Week. We were truly blessed to have a guest speaker with us for that week. The Rev. Russ Parker is an Anglican Priest and has been a Director of the Acorn Trust. His main area of expertise is on healing, forgiveness and reconciliation ministry. This fits in well with a Diocesan project in Cork spearheaded by Bishop Paul Colton called 'Centenaries' Commemoration and Reconciliation Project 2019-2023. In the early 1920's Cork was one of the most violent places in Ireland and the purpose of this project is to exercise a ministry of reconciliation and to enable people to tell their stories in a way that is conducive and enriching to life and contributes to the life of the Church of Ireland. The need of healing past wounds lies deep in all of us and through talks on church being the beating heart of community, reconciliation, listening, forgiveness, blessing and the power of the cross, Russ shared his passion and expertise with us. Anyone that came to listen was inspired, uplifted and went away with a new sense of purpose. In that week I learned so much that will be useful in my ministry but also a lot about the power and methods of communication. There was a true sense that this is where God had called me to be for my placement. I was able to let go of things that had been tugging at my heart and to give it up in prayer and in blessing to God.

Also, throughout Holy Week I had the pleasure of spending time with the ladies who run Blarney Toddlers group and I had the great delight to meet Sister Consillia, who had lived in West Belfast for 34 years. Sister Consillia is a wonderful example of a life lived in and to the service of God. It was a real privilege to spend time in her company. I also attended the Diocesan Chrism Eucharist in Ross Cathedral, Rosscarberry on Maundy Thursday. This is an annual service in which holy oil is consecrated for the use in pastoral and sacramental rites for the year ahead. Also, at this service licensed and commissioned lay church workers, clergy and the bishop renew their commitment to ministry. On Friday I took part in a cross community walk of witness around the nearby town of Ballincollig.

On Easter Saturday Richard and I attended the Easter Light Service in St Fin Barres Cathedral, where the Easter Candle was lit, and everybody was asked to renew their baptism vows. It was a really special service in a special place. Easter Sunday was spent leading the Eucharist service in Blarney. Throughout the next week I embarked on a number of visits with the Rector Ian to administer Holy Communion to those who cannot get to church. I also took part in a morning Bible study group that is looking at the whole idea of blessing. I had the opportunity to visit the Church Youth Camp in Bandon. What a joy it was to see such a vibrant committed youth community. The youth band was amazing in leading worship and what really stood out was the amount of time that was invested in mentoring and developing the skills of these young people. They came across as excited to be there and grounded in faith. It was wonderful to experience a new side of pastoral ministry and spend time with people who could pass on wisdom and encouragement. On the Sunday after Easter I was given the opportunity to preach and I spoke on what we could learn from the disciple Thomas and how we can develop a deeper more authentic faith. It was received well, in fact I got a round of applause in St Peter's! It was a wonderful experience to share the word of God with the congregations in both Carrigrohane and Blarney.

To finish I sat in on a few meetings, went to Blarney Toddlers, the Growth Group and attended a debrief session before I travelled home to Cullybackey. I was truly blessed to have spent Easter in this part of Ireland. In between times I have been able to explore a little. Richard and I have been to Kinsale, Cobh and Bantry. We have enjoyed the hospitality of the parishioners having been invited into their homes for coffee and dinner.

The clergy Ian and Robert have been encouraging, welcoming and went out of their way to provide me with an interesting experience of day to day parish life.

So, as I reflect on the last year, I feel incredibly settled that I am fulfilling the purpose that God has intended for me. It hasn't been easy and there



have been rough days when the deadlines loomed, and life seemed a tad overwhelming. But I have made it through and everyday I am reminded of the goodness of God and how everything happens according to his will and purpose. That we are called to flourish and that everything we do is for the glory of God. Being part of a different parish has given me a new focus and a renewed love for scripture, prayer and living life on purpose. I have learned a lot this year academically and practically so that hopefully I will be able to put all these lessons and experience into practice in the future and continue on this journey into ministry.

I would like to thank all of you who hold me in your prayers. Your faith and encouragement means a lot. I look forward to spending the summer at home and catching up with you all.

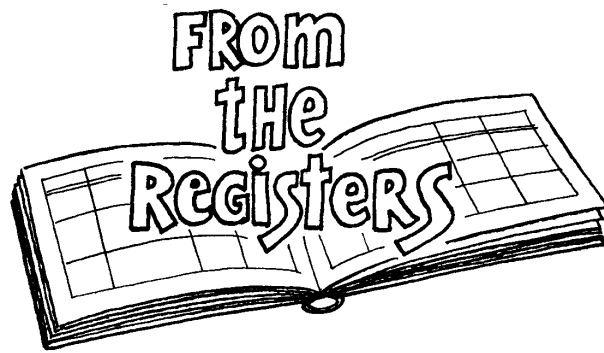

Mary was born on 25th March 1918 and was one of eleven children. Mary was born into the war years when life was austere but it gave her the values of humility and thriftiness by which she lived the remainder of her life. Mary married her childhood sweetheart Herbert at the outbreak of WW2. He went on to become a captain in the Green Hussars but unfortunately he was killed in action at El Alamein. She faced her tragic loss with courage and without complaint. Mary then moved to Worcester to help her niece and nephew when their mum passed away. When in Worcester she met and married her second husband, Flying Officer Peter Worrall whose job, after the war, brought both of them to Belfast. They had three children, Christopher, Pamela and Catherine and a church life which began in St Peter's, Belfast, before moving to St Patrick's, Ballymena. Mary was a very private lady whose life centred around her family. When her physical health declined, she was determined to stay at home. She was most grateful for the care given to her by her family and the wonderful Bluebirds who enabled her to stay in her own house surrounded by her family and the things that she loved most. Mary celebrated her 100th birthday with her son, daughters, grandchildren, great grandchildren and her friends. She was a lovely lady who will be missed by all of her family and friends.
