FAMILYWELLNESSPROJECT TOP TIPS

Resilience is our ability to cope in the face of adversity, trauma or stress. This is something we begin to learn in childhood.

Here are some top tips for helping children build resilience.

- Remember, bad feelings don't last, have a purpose and prompt us to do things differently.
- Try to normalise setbacks. Help your child to see that it is not unusual to have difficulties in life.
- Help them to see that problems can be solved.
- Encourage young people to keep things in perspective the problem is usually confined to only one part of their lives.
- Remember the value of humour laughing can be a great release (but only if it is well-intentioned).
- Encourage children/young people to accept responsibility for their actions.
- When reading stories, or discussing events, point out how people manage to overcome difficulties.
- Remember that learning is often frustrating. Encourage children/young people to persist and believe they can get there.



Provide support. Help them to see there are people who care about them and can give them help and advice when needed.



Create a positive environment emphasising the importance of relationships and having a sense of purpose.

Dear friends,

The last twelve months have been exhausting and it has been difficult to focus on anything other than my treatment plan. I have just received my last proton injection as part of the clinical trial and this stage of the journey is complete. I now need time to recover and regain my strength and energy.

Having advanced prostate cancer means that I will be receiving quarterly hormone injections for the rest of my life and will have very regular checkups with my oncologist. There are no guarantees, but it is hoped that I will be free of further treatment for years to come.

As a family, we are incredibly grateful for the amazing care and support we have received from the Cancer Centre at the Belfast City Hospital. We are also conscious that we have been carried by the love and prayers of so many people, especially the people of Connor diocese. I cannot thank you all enough for your faithfulness and care in praying for me and my family.

My family have been amazing in love and support and they have also been carrying their own hopes and fears. We have also been very blessed by the peace and joy we have experienced, as Jesus has clearly journeyed with us on this strange and unwelcome journey. He has been with us, giving us hope and healing.

Over the last few months, I have had various conversations with my oncologist, my GP and my family. With a very heavy heart and spirit, it has become clear to me that for the sake of the diocese and my own long-term health, I should retire on health grounds.

My medical advice has been clear that I will not have the energy I used to have, and the ongoing treatment will affect my ability to fulfil the very demanding role as Bishop of Connor.



I have followed the process necessary and it has been agreed that I can retire on health grounds. The Archbishop of Armagh has been supportive of this and I have informed him that I will retire on 31st December 2019, giving the necessary three months' notice. This will also give me time to recover and to be able to plan a move to our new home.

I am conscious that yet again the responsibility for the diocese falls to the three Archdeacons and I am very grateful for their willingness to serve the diocese in this way. At this stage, my aim is to be in St Anne's Cathedral on Christmas Eve and in Lisburn Cathedral on Christmas Day. This will allow me to fulfil my ministry as Bishop once more before I retire.

I will write to you again when my plans have been finalized, but suffice to say it has been an amazing privilege and joy to have served you as Bishop.

Be assured of my continued prayers for you all.

Ability Cafe

I'm sure we can all say that we enjoy going out for a bite to eat! We all know that it is very important to support local businesses, shops and cafes in our town. That being the case, let me tell you about a new coffee shop in the Ballymena area that has just opened (in August 2019) and is very worthy of our support. The Ability @ the Drawbridge Café in the ECOS is a social enterprise café run by Ulster Supported Employment Ltd (Usel). Usel, which won the 'Social Impact' award at the 2018 Social Enterprise Awards, seeks to equip people with disabilities and health conditions with the training, help and support they need to enter employment.

Ability (a) the Drawbridge café currently provides for several young people hoping to get into the workplace. It's not just about the café, the coffee or the food - it's about providing opportunities for young people who wouldn't get them elsewhere. The café offers the chance for them to build up self-esteem and self-confi-



dence; to develop new skills in a supportive environment; to achieve and accomplish their goals and to build a positive future for themselves. I think this is a great opportunity for the church to offer its friendship, encouragement and support to the Chef John, the staff and the young people at Ability Café. The café is a great stop-off after a walk, a cycle or a park run round the ECOS centre. It's also a fabulous place for a catch up with some friends over a coffee or some lunch. I can personally testify to the great quality of the coffee and the food! The café also caters for events; it recently provided fabulous food for the Mid and East Antrim Council at the launch of the Mid and East Antrim ECOS Innovation Centre.

I would like to say a very big "Hello," to you all in my first Curate's Letter. I have only been here with you all in Ballymena Parish for a few weeks but I am already beginning to feel at home. The warmth of the welcome I have received from so many of you has been overwhelming. Thank you so much for your well wishes, prayers and words of encouragement. Please continue to bear with me as I settle in and learn about all that goes on in the Parish.

My Ordination on Sunday 8th September was a wonderful occasion. From the bells ringing to the wonderful music, to the sermon and then to the Ordination Prayer with the Laying on of Hands, the service was incredibly uplifting and moving. For me the service marked both the end of my Deacon Internship and my training at the Church of Ireland Institute and the begin-



ning of my curacy and my future ministry journey. It was a moment and an occasion I will never forget. I was truly blessed by the support and encouragement of all those who attended and I am so appreciative to all those from the parish who were able to be there.

One thing that will take a little while to get my head around is navigating the Ballymena area. I've been telling many of you about my getting mixed-up when I'm driving around. I have driven round a roundabout more than once in one go, have had to do two loops of the one-way system before I went on to the right road and have had a freaky moment coming off Harryville Bridge.



When reflecting on my recent experiences of travelling around the Ballymena area, I got to thinking about some of the journeys we read about in the Old Testament. I thought of Abraham who packed up his whole family and travelled from Ur to Haran and then on into Canaan, of Moses and the Israelites wandering in the

desert and of Ruth following her mother-in-law Naomi into a new land and to a new people. We can imagine the emotion they felt as they embarked upon new adventures and experiences, as they journeyed through both joyful and tough times and as they sought God in all of these times.

As we all journey through life, we go with the assurance that God goes with us. The Bible tells us this time and again. I love the promise of Joshua 1:9 - 'Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.' The Lord God travels with us; behind, ahead and beside us. We need only lean on Him - 'Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths'. (Proverbs 3:5-6)

We have also been equipped with the tools we need for our journey. God has given us the example of His Son Jesus Christ; He has given us the power of the Holy Spirit; He has given us the great gift that is prayer and He has placed us in a family - the family and community of the Church. We need to uphold and encourage each other in prayer, care for one another and provide a welcome for all those who join us on this journey of faith. I have been on the receiving end of all of these things since I have joined you in the Parish and I can say that they are very much worth sharing!

As I finish, I'll say that I look forward to meeting all of those I have not yet met and to all the adventures we will experience together in the time to come.
